NINETEEN LIVES LOST IN TEXAS HURRICANE

(By Associated Press.) CORPUS CHRISTI, Texas, August 21.—The loss of life from the tropical storm, which struck Corpus Christi and 10 adjacent south Texas counties on Friday night, was placed at 13 tonight, including 9 members of the crew of the small freighter Pilot Boy, which sank off the Aransas Pass jetties. Two Mexican men and one Mexican woman were killed at Katherine, a settlement on the King ranch, near Alice, Texas, and one Mexican was reported killed at San Diego. Both towns are from 50 to 60 miles inland.

their families. The fate of these people is unknown. Houses on the North Beach were torn from their foundations and piled in heaps, while larger residences on the bay front bluff were caved in and otherwise damaged. Approaches to the big causeway were washed out and railroad trestles torn away, leaving the rails suspended over the water. Hundreds of homeless citizens spent Friday night in the city jail, courthouse and hotels, all of which were in complete darkness owing to the fracture of the power plants. Communication with the outside world was cut off early Friday evening and only partly restored Sunday morning.

SURPRISE WEDDING AT THE MONTANA

To the anticipated pleasure of an evening of bridge at the home of Miss Maud E. McCrate was added the surprise of a wedding, Mr. Herman Albert claiming Miss McCrate as his bride a few minutes after midnight Sunday morning. No words can express the love and devotion with which Mrs. Albert is held by her many friends; "to know her is to love her." She has been a resident of Tonopah since the days of the San Francisco disaster in 1906 and in those years has claimed scores of friends. She is the daughter of Mrs. Daniel McCrate and for some years past has held the responsible position of secretary treasurer of the Montana Tonopah Mines company, bearing the distinction of being one of few women who have successfully managed a mine.

HUGHES SPENDS BUSY SUNDAY

(By Associated Press.) LOS ANGELES, August 21.—Chas. E. Hughes spent a strenuous day of rest in Los Angeles yesterday. He reached the city shortly before 10 o'clock from San Francisco, went to church, held a public reception at his hotel, took a hundred mile motor drive, visiting Pasadena and Long Beach, stopped at the Los Angeles Museum on the way back and did not reach his hotel last night until more than an hour after he had expected to do so.

HUGHES MENACED BY AN ANARCHIST

(By Associated Press.) LONG BEACH, Cal., August 21.—The police made public a threatening letter, said to have been received by the secretary to Gov. Hughes, where in the life of Hughes was threatened. According to the postmark it was mailed at Los Angeles late Saturday and read: "We warned you before you left the supreme bench you never would sit in the presidential chair. We will get you. Watch out at Santa Ana." The letter was unsigned.

HEADLESS WOMAN FOUND IN CHICAGO

(By Associated Press.) CHICAGO, August 21.—The headless body of Mrs. Rosario Cosentino, and two children, one a baby of six months, the other a year old, apparently dying of starvation, were found in their apartment today. The police believe the woman was chopped to death by an ax. The children were not wounded. The woman had been dead three or four days, the police say.

FATHER DIED LAST MAY IN ALSACE SISTER IN PARIS IGNORANT OF DEATH

The father of Father Jerome Diss, pastor of St. Patrick's church, died last May in Wossonne, province of Alsace, Germany, and news of the death was only received yesterday by the son in Tonopah. The story came through another priest in northern Wisconsin, a native of Alsace, who succeeded in receiving a letter from home after three months' delay through detention in the border country of Switzerland before it could be safely transmitted through a neutral seaport. The Wisconsin priest asked Father Diss to notify his sister in Paris of the bereavement, as it was almost certain that there was no communication between the war zone

around Alsace and the French capital. The elder Mr. Diss was 87 years old and the son had not seen him for years. The last time Father Diss went to the old home, some ten years ago, he was politely but firmly advised to cut his visit short on threat of being compelled to serve his term in the German army. The Diss family is of French extraction and, like all others of the province, have little use for their German conquerors. It was the fervent wish of the deceased that he would live to see his native province back again under the tricolor. Father Diss did not receive the letter yesterday in time to advise his congregation.

YOU BET WIPED OUT BY BIG FOREST FIRE

GRASS VALLEY, Cal., August 21.—The historic old mining town of You Bet, which twice had a population of 2000, left in recent years for the exclusive use of a colony of Chinese placer miners, was destroyed last night by a forest fire coming in from three directions. Fifty buildings were destroyed, but no one was killed or injured.
