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UNDULY SUSPICIOUS?

ACCORDING to reports from Washington the president and his advisors are indignant because the union labor men who are conducting the railway negotiations have let it leak out that they are skeptical of Mr. Wilson's sincerity, that they regard his professed friendliness to labor with some measure of suspicion. Possibly they should not have let their skepticism leak out, but it is not surprising that they should be skeptical and suspicious in view of what Dr. Wilson has himself said about labor and labor unions. Said Dr. Wilson on June 13, 1909, in a public address: "You know what the usual standard of the employe is in our day. It is to give as little as he may for his wages. Labor is standardized by the trades unions and this is the standard to which it is made to conform. No one is suffered to do more than the average workman can do; in some trades and handicrafts no one is suffered to do more than the least skillful of his fellows can do within the hours allotted to a day's labor, and no one may work out of hours at all, or volunteer anything beyond the minimum. I need not point out how economically disastrous such a regulation of labor is. It is so unprofitable to the employer that in some trades it will presently not be worth while to attempt anything at all. He had better stop altogether than operate at an inevitable and invariable loss." And on March 18, 1907, Woodrow Wilson said, in a public speech: "We speak too exclusively of the capitalist class. There is another, as formidable an enemy to equality and freedom of opportunity as it is, and that is the class formed by the labor organizations and leaders of the country."

DEMOCRATS EXTRAVAGANT

SENATOR TAGGART, of Indiana, the recently elected Democrat who will run for senator in Indiana again this fall, has taken occasion to lecture the Democratic party for its "gross extravagance," following in the footsteps of Rep. Fitzgerald, the Democratic chairman of the House appropriations committee. "The power to tax is the power to destroy, and we do not want to destroy the people's earning power by over-taxation," said Senator Taggart. "Instead of squandering money and passing pork-barrel bills, would it not be better to cut out these useless expenditures? But if it be the fixed and determined purpose of Congress to go on yearly increasing these appropriations, would it not be better to turn them to things that would help the people instead of pouring money into sink-holes, never to return a cent upon the investment?" The senator declared that every senator and congressman would go bankrupt were he to manage his own affairs with the extravagance Congress is displaying in spending the people's money. Coming immediately on top of Gov. Hughes denunciation of Democratic extravagance, as well as the signing of the \$42,000,000 rivers and harbors "pork" bill by President Wilson, Senator Taggart's speech has occasioned the utmost indignation at Democratic headquarters and there is talk of leaving the senator to shift for himself in his efforts to re-election in Indiana.

GORGING OFF THE CORPSE

THE small fry of the European powers known as the Balkan states are fattening off the victors in their struggle to down Germany and they are exacting their pound of flesh with as relentless a rapacity as ever Shylock demanded his settlement in the pound of flesh. Whatever may have been the motives of the chief participants of the war there is no question about the selfishness of Bulgaria, Greece and Rumania. Servia was attacked and had to defend herself, while Albania and Montenegro were dragged into the fray by main force. Bulgaria waited until she thought the central powers were going to win before she allied herself with the Turk and attacked struggling Serbia. Greece violated her offensive and defensive treaty with Serbia, but did not take the Teutonic side because the allied guns were frowning down on her chief cities. Rumania waited until assured of the triumph of the entente allies when she threw her strength where she thought it would do the most good.

Greece will have a general election next month and it seems as if the activity at Saloniki was staged to influence its outcome. The king of Greece lives in deadly fear of an uprising. At the last election he mobilized his army to keep the soldiers away from the polls. His soldiers are now fighting the Bulgarians in an irregular way, which may become a formal war before the sun sets today. Greece is doing nothing to curry favor with either side and will get little of the spoils of war when the map of Europe is redrawn. If the Bulgarians and Greeks are fighting hard Greece will find herself in the war very soon and she will receive little thanks from the entente allies for trying to sit at the table at which they expect to carve Turkey. Rumania could not afford to take the losing side and this fear has kept her out of trouble. Her farmers, grain dealers and merchants have reaped enormous profits by selling grain and mineral oils to the central empires, and it is alleged that no small amount of Russian grain has flowed through Rumania to the same destination. Rumania is as selfish as the other two and since she lies between the Russian hammer and the Bulgarian anvil there was nothing else to do than to save her face by declaring war against the weakest of the central powers. She bravely refrained from declaring herself against Germany, but struck at Austria-Hungary at a time when that nation is engaged in a death struggle with the ever increasing horde of Slavs pouring over the Carpathians. By joining the entente allies Rumania has a chance of getting a slice of Transylvania when Austria goes to pieces. It did not require strong inducements to make Rumania break her pledges by joining the entente powers. The resolution was taken the

moment she was assured the armies of Grand Duke Nicholas could hold their ground seized in the recent advances in spite of the cream of the German and Austrian armies being thrown forward in the first line of resistance.

This war began in the Balkans, where it smoldered for centuries, and it may be decided in the Balkans, where victory for the allies would cut the Teutonic powers from their near eastern confederates and would leave Austria-Hungary open to attack from the south. Some American military experts now believe that the road to Berlin runs through Budapest and Vienna and not through Warsaw or Cologne. For this reason Germany is trying to support Bulgaria and hold the line there. Italian troops at Saloniki means formal war between Germany and Italy, which was declared last Sunday. This war is still spreading and may attain large proportions at any time. Kitchener was right when he predicted that it would be a three years' war.

VEACH BATS BALL AT WILL


