

AIR BATTLES WAGED ON THE EAST FRONT

(By Associated Press.)
PETROGRAD, Sept. 11.—A group of seven German aeroplanes flew over the region of Koyel-Rovische railway line, says the communication from the War office today.

"One of our aviators' staff cavalry, Capt. Kasevok, engaged machines in successive encounters, forcing them to take flight. From one of the machines a long column of smoke was seen to issue.

"Yesterday, in the region of the upper Horosanka river, our gallant regimental command, Col. Vladimir Timofetev Febedev, was killed.

"In the wooded Capathians in battles from August 31 to September 6, inclusive, we captured 15 officers, 1889 men, two mountain guns, 26 machine guns and a large number of rifles, hand grenades and cartridges.

"On the Baltic sea yesterday morning enemy aeroplanes raided the island of Runo, in the gulf of Riga, without achieving any results. During the day enemy aeroplanes approached several times over Irben straits. They were engaged by our aviators and driven off. Midshipman Safonov forced one of the enemy's seaplanes to alight."

BERLIN, Sept. 11.—Another aerial attack on the Rumania Black sea coast and on Russian warships in those waters was announced officially today as follows:

"German seaplanes successfully dropped bombs on grain silos, oil tanks and the railroad station at Constanza and also on the Russian naval forces in port. Notwithstanding a hostile counter action all our planes returned undamaged."

SANTA ROSA MINE MAKING A RECORD

The Santa Rosa mine, in Inyo county, owned jointly by the West End Consolidated and several individuals, including H. C. Brougher, W. J. Douglass and Ed. Erickson, is bound to make one of the big silver-lead mines of the country, in the estimation of the chief stockholders, who visited the property last Friday and Saturday. The party, headed by B. F. Edwards, vice president of the West End, returned last evening greatly elated over the prospects of the company. They report that 1600 sacks of high grade belonging to leasers was on the dump ready for shipping and 500 sacks of company ore was waiting transportation. The only question remaining to be solved was that of transportation, and the company immediately placed an order for a caterpillar tractor and three five-ton trailers to be delivered forthwith.

WONDER BARBER WOUNDS WIFE AND THEN KILLS SELF

Wednesday afternoon, Chauncey Holloway, commonly known as "Curly, the barber," fired two shots at his wife, Jeanette, one of which took effect in the right shoulder, causing a severe flesh wound, but she succeeded in evading him and rushed from the house. She had not gone far when she heard two shots and returned to find him lying in a pool of blood on the floor near the front door. He had shot himself through the head, just behind the right ear, one shot evidently going wild, as it crashed through a looking glass and into the side wall.—Fallon Eagle.

ARTESIAN FLOW IN THE CARSON VALLEY

The Dake well drilling machine has recently completed two more artesian wells in this valley—one at Chas. Gardella's ranch, near Genoa, flows 27 gallons per minute, while one at the Alphone Glock ranch, in the Haybourn tract, flows better than 70 gallons per minute, and is one of the heaviest flowing wells yet struck in Carson valley, says the Gardnerville Courier.

\$60,000 FOR A RANCH

A big land deal was put through by Robert Grimmon and Ralph Springmeyer, the purchasing of all holdings of the Vallem Bros., of Alpine county, together with their sheep and cattle holdings. The Vallem home ranch, the Barber ranch and range lands, were included in the deal. The consideration has not been made public, but is known to have been in excess of \$60,000.

We demand from Mexico the protection of our citizens and the security of our border from depredations. Much will be gained if Mexico is convinced that we contemplate no meddlesome interference with what does not concern us, but that we propose to insist in a firm and candid manner upon the performance of international obligations. To a stable government, appropriately discharging its international duties, we should give ungrudging support. A short period of firm, consistent and friendly dealing will accomplish more than many years of vacillation.—From Mr. Hughes' Speech of Acceptance.
