DRILLING IN THE EASTERN DISTRICT

The Tonopah Belmont Development company has entered actively upon the development of the eastern territory—nearly a thousand acres—which it recently acquired, some by option, some by actual purchase. Already churning has begun on the East Union estate and a depth of about one hundred feet attained. The churn will be replaced within a few days by a core drill, the machinery now being in place. The next work to be undertaken will be the deepening of the shaft in the East End, a property that has been purchased outright by the Belmont and which is on the easterly trend of the main vein system. Already considerable preliminary work has been done in the shaft, which is well timbered and has been dewatered. The shaft is already 450 feet deep and the formation at bottom is very promising, indicative of the approach to the permanent formation, as shown by the increase in silicification. Should the ore be encountered in this working, which is its farthest east in the district, it will mean the erection of a score of galvans frames and the investment of vast sums of money.
