BAN PLACED UPON CAMPAIGN BUTTONS

(By Associated Press.) NEW YORK, Sept. 30.—No campaign buttons collectively bearing pictures of Theodore Roosevelt, Wm. H. Taft and Chas. E. Hughes will be worn by the guests at the Union League club reception in honor of the Republican presidential candidate next Tuesday evening, it was said today.

Friends of Roosevelt has intimated to Chairman W. R. Wilcox that undue emphasis has been placed upon the fact that the colonel and Prof. Taft will meet at the reception for the first time in the field of politics since the Progressive party was born in 1912.

The suggestion has been made to the committee arranging the reception that the real purpose of the gathering is to permit Republicans to pay their respects to their standard bearer in the present campaign, and not to provide occasion for a reconciliation between Colonel Roosevelt and Mr. Taft.

The colonel is an honorary member of the Union League club and accepted the invitation to the reception because it is to be given in honor of Mr. Hughes, it was explained. While he will shake hands with Prof. Taft it will be the same manner of greeting as was extended when the two met a year ago at the funeral of Prof. Lounsbury at New Haven.

Roosevelt Given Noisy Greeting

(By Associated Press.) BATTLE CREEK, Mich., Sept. 30. Thousands of people in all parts of Michigan, massed in gaily decorated streets, gave Roosevelt a noisy greeting when he arrived to address the Republican mass meeting this afternoon. It was the first speech of the campaign in Michigan for Hughes and the second he has made thus far in his behalf. Roosevelt was kept on the jump for two hours after he left the train. He reviewed a long parade and held a reception. While taking a two hour rest a great crowd filled the circus tent where the meeting was held.

Dogs Imprisoned in a Burning Building

Prompt action and heavy water pressure stopped in its incipency what might have proved a very bad fire this morning at the head of Mineral street. It occurred in a double cabin owned by Mrs. Lawrence, just back of the C. L. Richards residence. The blaze was discovered by Mrs. Richards, who called upon the department just as the engineer at the Wandering Boy shaft saw the smoke and gave a warning whistle. John Cooper, who occupied the front of the house, was asleep when the fire occurred and he hurriedly dressed, his apartment being filled with smoke. The rear of the building, which was occupied by two men, was where the blaze originated. They had left the house an hour or two before and are unable to account for it starting.

Suffrage Movement Meets Opposition

(By Associated Press.) NEW YORK, Sept. 30.—Plans to extend the campaign against the woman suffrage movement were made at a meeting of prominent women from nine states at the headquarters of the national association opposed to woman suffrage in this city today. An effort will be made, it was said, to form "anti" organizations in every congressional district in the country. More than 40,000 women were said to have been enrolled already in Ohio.

Body of Emperor Consigned to Grave

(By Associated Press.) CHANGTSEFU, China, August 23 (correspondent).—One year after the movement that made Yuan Shi Kai emperor was formerly launched the body of the dead president was placed in its final resting place near this city. The site of the distinguished president's grave is surrounded by a great semi-circular wall surmounted by high battlements with openings similar to the gates of Chinese city walls. Effectively barred watch towers flank both sides.

Big Political Rallies to be Held

With a big attendance the Republican party last night organized a Hughes Republican club, both for the women and men voters of the party. The new headquarters in the Richards building was crowded with enthusiasts anxious to enroll themselves for the great campaign now opening up all over the country.

Short and snappy talks were made by S. K. Moore, Judge Chambers and William M. Gotwaldt upon the issues of the day and all the speakers were heartily applauded at the conclusion of their addresses, showing the intense desire of the voters for a change in the national administration at the coming election.

Chairman Grier of the county central committee presided and in a short but forcible talk outlined the plans of the committee relative to the campaign in Nye county this year, which is expected to be the most extensive ever undertaken by any political party in this county.

The first big gun of the campaign will be fired in Tonopah next Wednesday night when the state candidates, consisting of Hon. Sam Platt, Hon. E. E. Roberts, Judge Moran and R. A. McKay, candidates respectively for United States senator, representative in congress, judge of the supreme court of Nevada and clerk of the supreme court of Nevada, will appear at the Airdome in this city at 8:15 p. m.

The Tonopah military band will give a concert on the streets in the early evening and will also play during the intervals at the Airdome. The Hon. Hugh H. Brown of Tonopah will be the chairman of the evening.

Another Big Loan Will be Floated

(By Associated Press.) NEW YORK, Sept. 30.—J. P. Morgan, financial agent for the British government in the United States, engaged passage on the steamer New York sailing today. He reported he was going to London to arrange for floating another British war loan of a quarter billion dollars backed by American securities. Henry P. Davidson, Morgan's partner, departed for England several weeks ago. Bankers questioned about the opportunity for floating another British loan said that never in the history of the country had there been such demands made for bonds.

Girls are Said to have Lured Iowan Will Lead World in Hospital Work

(By Associated Press.) PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 30.—Sir Henry Burdet, a distinguished authority on hospital matters, in addressing the closing session of the 18th annual convention of the American Hospital Association here today, said he looked to the United States to lead the world in hospital work. "I leave this country with the knowledge that America has made great strides in hospital management in the past decade," he said. Dr. John A. Hornsby of Chicago told the delegates that he believed the near future would see the amalgamation of the Catholic Hospital association with the American Hospital association. He condemned the practice of making rapid diagnosis for surgical operations, however necessary, to relieve patients in a condition which required prompt treatment, saying it tended to form habits of negligence in the young surgeon.

Price of Coal Will Soar Still Higher

(By Associated Press.) WILKESBARRE, Pa., Sept. 30.—Anthracite operators, testifying before the state commission created by the Pennsylvania legislature to investigate the cause of higher cost of coal to consumers, declared today that instead of preparing to lower the prices they expect their soon will be a substantial increase. Witnesses agreed that the wage contract entered into by the mine workers and operators last spring and the workmen's compensation law, which went into effect this year in Pennsylvania, are the principal causes for the increased cost of coal.
