

REPUBLICANS BRAVE BAD WEATHER

(Special to the Bonanza.)

YERINGTON, Nev., Oct. 2.—On Saturday the Republican candidates touring the state closed the week and month with all signs pointing to success. Beginning Friday, they had marched through the two banner Republican counties of Douglas and Lyon and were met at every stop with the greatest encouragement. The most significant feature was the stop at Wellington in a driving rain during the afternoon, which would have been a good excuse for anyone withholding his presence.

Adverse weather failed to dampen the ardor of the citizens of that section, who drove for many miles to attend the afternoon meeting. At the Ludwig mine 200 men are employed and the poll of the number disclosed that there were less than a score of them Democrats and only a fair following of Socialists. At the evening meeting in Yerington the hall was packed to the doors in spite of other attractions. Everywhere the organization is going on with celerity. Congressman Roberts dwelt on the advantage of improved mail service and not a cheap bargain affair such as the administration has forced on the public for the sake of making money out of the people. Mr. Roberts said it was his ambition to

do something for the lands that need only water and that after six years he was near the goal as chairman of the irrigation committee and desired to get back that he might fill a place where he could help Nevada more.

Speaking of the Pittman land bill Mr. Platt said he would fight it, if permitted to go to the senate. It provides for the sale of the public domain in such a way that the poor man cannot buy it, and it is the poor man, the pioneer of courage, to whom Nevada must look for its development and increased population. A rich man might buy the public domain, but that would not populate the state. The speaker said that Pittman's reported willingness to convert all the public domain in Nevada to the use of the state for sale at auction would be disastrous and result in Nevada getting no further federal aid. Mr. Platt also dwelt on the suffrage amendment and the necessity for a protective tariff after the war.

PRICE OF A WOMAN IS CAUSE OF A TRAGEDY

CHICAGO, Oct. 2.—Seven men fought a revolver battle over the "sale" of a woman for \$200 early this morning, with the result that one man was killed and another was so seriously wounded physicians say he will die. Fifty-six shots were exchanged in the fight, which occurred at a roadhouse owned by Samuel Harris. "Peggy" O'Day, the man killed, was a saloonkeeper. Daniel Hartman was shot through a lung. Harris told the police that Hartman offered to "sell" him the woman. The shooting was the result of a dispute over the price.

"DOCTOR" RETURNS TO HOSPITAL FOR INSANE

BIG TROOP MOVEMENT

EL PASO, Oct. 2.—The tenth provisional army division, composed of the Ohio, Kentucky and Massachusetts national guard units and a detachment of regulars encamped in this district, departed today on what is said by army officers to be the biggest troop movement ever undertaken in the United States in time of peace. A line of men stretching fifteen miles long on a road will cover 200 miles before returning to El Paso.
