INTERNATIONAL "NEWS" ONLY RUMOR

THE newspapers in the United States that are using the International news service find themselves up against it in proper fashion. They can receive no information from the sources and seats of news in the allied nations either by mail, telegraph or cable. What they do publish, claiming to emanate from such points, must of necessity be garbled.

The International news is the Hearst service and, in order to give it the sensational aspect, which is Hearst's specialty, the dispatches have been hideously distorted, such as an item recently appearing under the heading "London in Flames." So inaccurate was the "information" given by the International news service that it finally became necessary to place an embargo. Hereafter the International "news" appearing under certain date lines will be pure, or impure, fiction. The Examiner and the coast papers taking the service through the Examiner, will be hard put to fill their columns with war news just at a time when correct information is sought for with such avidity.

Meanwhile the Associated Press continues to cover the war and other European news with infinite detail. Neither the Central nor the entente powers have fault to find with the Associated Press service, because it is accurate and unbiased. By the way, the Bonanza takes the Associated Press report. SUBMARINE VIOLATED MONROE DOCTRINE

(By Associated Press.) PARIS, Oct. 16.—According to Jean Herbet, military strategist and writer on international affairs, the German submarine U-53 made a breach in the Monroe doctrine by sinking vessels of the New England coast and it remains to be seen whether the United States will "sustain the celebrated American tradition, or let it be cast aside." "France is only a disinterested spectator in the debate," says M. Herbet, "because it makes little difference to her whether the Germans operate on one side of the Atlantic or the other, but it will produce a great change in the political equilibrium of the world if the doctrine shall be abrogated by President Wilson."

"President Monroe, in formulating his doctrine, opposed naval as well as military control. One cannot be tolerated without opening the door to the other." M. Herbet recalls the case of French warships in 1870 cruising off New York, in watch for German vessels. The French ships violated no laws, he says, yet their action resulted in the American secretary of state sending a warning note to France. The principle then laid down has not been forgotten, he adds. "President Wilson," says M. Herbet, in conclusion, "was no less categorical when during the present war he upheld the same rule with regard to England in the case of the steamer Vinland."
