

FIRST HONORS FOR THE TONOPAH HIGH

Football score: Tonopah, 25; Goldfield, 6. The score comes very near to telling the story. For the first time in years it is possible to print the score with Tonopah at the long end. Winning from Tonopah had gotten to be a habit with Goldfield—a habit that was difficult to break. The victory was a direct result of the physical training to which the Tonopah boys have subjected themselves since the opening of the term. A spectator could easily see the steady change from the odds in favor of Goldfield, at the beginning of the game, to the point where the teams appeared evenly matched, and, from then until the end of the game, the continually increasing odds in favor of Tonopah.

The game was called at 3 o'clock. Goldfield received the ball and by a quick succession of plays which Tonopah seemed unable to solve, carried the ball across the field for a touchdown in the first minute and a half of play. They failed to kick goal. For the remainder of the quarter the Tonopah boys were on the defensive practically all the time, but by hard work prevented Goldfield from scoring again. In the second quarter Tonopah gradually assumed the offensive as Goldfield weakened, and near the end of the quarter Burdette Polard carried the ball over for the first Tonopah touchdown—and the prize box of candy offered by Jimmie's candy store. Tonopah kicked goal and left the score at the end of the half 7 to 6 in favor of Tonopah. After a 15 minute rest the Goldfield boys came back with renewed vigor and the two teams were so evenly matched that neither was able to score in the third quarter. In the fourth quarter the Tonopah boys were apparently holding up under the gruelling physical strain to so much better advantage than the Goldfield boys that the spectators easily foresaw the gains that Tonopah would make during this quarter. In the last few minutes of play Tonopah scored three touchdowns, one by Jimmie O'Connell and two by "Spud" Harrington. No goals were kicked and the game ended with the score 25 to 6.

Spectators were pleased with the clean playing and sportsmanlike football spirit exhibited by both teams. The Tonopah boys showed fine team work—the team work that does not show up "stars," but does win games. The boys and girls of the Tonopah high certainly proved that they are right behind their team. There were

on the side lines fully as many boosters from Tonopah high as from Goldfield high, and they let it be known from the beginning of the game that they were there to see Tonopah win.

After the game the Tonopah team was taken to the Goldfield hotel for dinner and afterward the entire Tonopah crowd was entertained at a dance. A midnight lunch ended the day of pleasure and the crowd arrived home about 2 o'clock Sunday morning.

The Tonopah high school faculty was well represented at the game. Those present were Mr. and Mrs. Cross, Mrs. Brown, and Messrs. Merrill, Dilworth, Greene and Chapman. Reverends Bailey and Bayless, both football enthusiasts, accompanied the Tonopah aggregation, as did W. T. Cuddy, Leo Harrington, Mr. Stotesbury and others.

The officials of the game were Mr. Erb of Goldfield, referee, and Prof. Bennett of Tonopah School of Mines, umpire, with Superintendents Wearlar and Dilworth as timekeepers.

The return game will be played in Tonopah on November 14.

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
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
