EFFORT TO RESTRAIN HIGH COST OF LIVING

COMBINATIONS WILL BE PUNISHED BY GOVERNMENT OF CANADA

(By Associated Press.) OTTAWA, Ont., Nov. 11.—Combining to enhance prices of necessities of life has been made an offense by the Canadian government, it was announced here yesterday. Penalties are \$5000 fine or two years' imprisonment.

The government has taken action by orders in council, under the war measures act, which gives them full power. Food, clothing, fuel and materials for manufacture are all classed as necessities. The existing Canadian law against "combinations" is strengthened.

"BILLY" ASH DIES IN SAN FRANCISCO

William Ash, formerly manager of the Tonopah Liqueur company and an old time Virginia City man, died today in San Francisco after a long illness.
