### DO YOUR SHOPPING AT HOME

THIS is the season when all men's thoughts turn to gifts and the pleasure of giving to those whom we love and whose affection reciprocates the sentiment. While the principle of give and take animates most of us in determining to what extent we shall recompense friendship or reward kindness, it does not imply that at the bottom of the giving there is nothing loftier than a mercenary motive. So long as the habit is fixed there is not much use in essaying an analysis of the practice which, on the whole, may be regarded as highly commendable. Nevertheless the fact that a man or woman, a son or daughter, a sweetheart or a lover, is looking around for some suitable article, suggests the advisability of buying that article at home, or so close to your natural habitat that you will be enabled to judge of the effect on the recipient by measuring it up from your own point of view. That is one reason why Christmas trading should be done at home and why the local merchant should be encouraged to offer a diversity of attractive presents. You cannot make a mistake in dealing with the home merchant, with whom you have a personal acquaintance and on whose judgment the customer may rely for what is commonly known as a "square deal." Mail order houses flourish at this season from the ardent desire of thousands to buy something that appeals to them in picture form but which, on submission, may prove to be the veriest trash.

The catalogue habit, once it asserts its deadly magnetism for the buyer, is almost impossible to overcome, for its victims return time and time again to be fleeced by the specious representations of firms thousands of miles away, who defy the buyer to secure any return of his money or to coax the seller into substituting something else for the article that did not prove as alluring as the catalogue would have it. The buyer who patronizes catalogue houses is not wholly to blame. He or she takes what is offered through nice advertising media and the buyer cannot be blamed because the home merchant is not wide awake to the opportunities that are steadily slipping away from his grasp. If the home merchant employs printers' ink with a judicious mind and a liberal purse he will not be found upon the mourners' bench when it comes to the day of reckoning. If he does not cultivate the friendship of local buyers by inviting them to inspect his stock, if he is afraid that his prices will repel trade and therefore keeps them under the counter, then he alone is to blame for the growth of the catalogue habit, which, once formed, is almost impossible to extirpate.

### WILSON'S FAMOUS VICTORY

HISTORY is culminating rapidly since election and it appears that almost every conceivable subject had been shelved until after that epochal event. The affairs that were used for the main-spring of the campaign are gradually unfolding like a movie show and each is taking its proper place exactly according to the forecast of the Republican orators. The latest came to pass yesterday when the terms of the Mexican protocol became public property for the first time. The terms of the endless negotiations which have been going on in Atlantic City for the past six months are not such as to win the admiration of red-blooded Americans, who believe in living up to the language of the forefathers who wrested this land of ours from the clutches of Great Britain, France and Spain. In plain language, the picnic at which three Mexican envoys were entertained during their stay in the United States as guests of the Wilson administration resolved that each nation would take care of the border on its own side. A glance behind the scenes will show how worthless is the consummation of the treaty, which concedes everything to the other fellow and gains nothing for the United States. The gallant General Pershing and his troops are ordered out of Mexico and forced to return to their own country without having accomplished anything from their order to "Get Villa, dead or alive." It is nothing more than a replica by land of the fiasco of Vera Cruz. The outcome deserves the undying contempt of the world and it is a foregone conclusion that American diplomacy of the Franklin K. Lane type is the true shirt-sleeved diplomacy that always excites the risibilities of men versed in international intrigue. Americans will blush with shame for the government that spent \$350,000,000 without gaining even the shadow of a victory from the bandit kings of our Latin neighbor.

### WE SHOULD WORRY

EASTERN financiers are working themselves into a frenzied state of mind over the glut of gold that hangs around the neck of the nation like the proverbial millstone. Bankers are holding meetings and foregathering to see how they can avert the penalty of having so much of the world's wealth amassed on this side of the Atlantic that they fear it points the way to expansion and panic after a dreadful era of inflation. So far as the Bonanza has heard after holding its well developed right ear to the ground listening for the coming of the millenium, there is no risk of any of this surplus gold being scattered broadcast in the land. On the contrary, the gold hoarders are filled with trepidation over the possibility that some of these bankrupt European countries in utter madness will remonetize silver on some fixed parity that will leave the gold on the hands of the owners or force them to part with it at bargain prices. The United States now holds one-third of the world's supply of gold and

the bankers say this is a precarious situation owing to the prevalent idea of the warring nations to restore silver to its former standing as the money of the people. In any event, silver is rapidly coming back into the estimation of financiers as the coming metal that will preserve the parity between nations whose treasuries have become dislocated by the insatiable demands of hostilities.

When one wants to find the news of the outside world he has to rely on the Associated Press, the only organization that has withstood the assaults of time. Yesterday the Hearst news service carried a story to the effect that Villa was in possession of Chihuahua, but the Associated Press came out with detailed accounts of the bandit king being driven off with great loss and that the capital of the most northern Mexican state was to all intents and purposes in the hands of the Carranzista government.
