

ORDERS TO THE DOG CATCHER DEFINED BY THE GRAND JURY

To the Editor, Tonopah Bonanza.
Dear Sir:—Since the publication of Rev. R. W. Bayless of Governor Emmet D. Boyle's telegram in connection with the killing of his dog, it has caused some of the people of Tonopah to be misled as to the orders given in the rabies quarantine matter, and as the people are entitled to know of such order, the following is in substance the orders Gholson was under at the time he killed the Bayless dog:
"Catch, if possible to do so without danger to yourself, all dogs and cats found running at large, and impound them. If not possible to catch them as per above order, then kill them."
The only change made in the above orders is the additional instruction to arrest all owners of dogs and cats who allow same to run at large. Gholson uses only No. 4 shot in killing cats and dogs and takes every precaution when doing so. For the further information of the public I enclose herewith copy of letter from State Quarantine officer Mack, which is self-explanatory.

Dear Sir:—Last night Governor Boyle called me by long distance telephone and read me your telegram to the attorney general regarding the rabies situation in Tonopah. This morning I am in receipt of a copy from the governor.

Upon the governor's advice, I immediately drafted a quarantine order

and telegraphed it to you. I also sent written copies to the sheriff, chairman of the board of county commissioners and the county clerk of Nye county, as required by law. Governor Boyle will confirm this quarantine within 48 hours and will issue a formal quarantine order over his signature. I think the action I have taken is as far as the law warrants me to go. I would suggest that the local officers, either those of Tonopah or the board of county commissioners of Nye county, issue a quarantine as soon as they can legally do so. I think they have authority to order all dogs confined or muzzled and to order all dogs and cats found running at large killed. Several counties have taken such action during the past year, the peace officers shooting dogs indiscriminately found running at large. It will be necessary for you to control dogs and cats if you are to prevent the rapid spread of rabies throughout the community. I agree with you that it is absolutely necessary that no favoritism be shown. Am I to assume from that opinion which you express that your local peace officers may find it difficult not to discriminate?

I will be glad to render your community every service possible in controlling the spread of rabies which is consistent with the law.

TUNGSTEN THEFTS LEAD TO ARRESTS

ALLEGED THIEVES IN CUSTODY ON CHARGE OF LOOTING CONCENTRATES

With the arrest of one man in Los Angeles this week, and the issuance of warrants for four more, a gang of ore thieves who have been operating from the tungsten mines at Bishop will undoubtedly be broken up, says the Inyo County Independent.

Last week, Robert Nichols was arrested in the southern city, accused with another man named Lyons of assaulting and robbing Joe Simons there on December 10. After Nichols had been in jail for several days he stated to the sheriff that on November 9, three men, named Johnson, Clayton and Arnold, hired him to drive them to Bishop by auto. After passing Bishop and going to the Tungsten Mines property the three men left the auto and went to the mine, returning within a short time with three 50-pound sacks of tungsten concentrates. It seems that Johnson knew where these concentrates were kept and took the other two men with him to get them. After finishing the job they returned to Los Angeles in the machine, where they sold the stuff.

Johnson was formerly employed as a miner for the company. One of the men for whom warrants have been issued has been arrested and is in jail in Los Angeles, and the other four men will undoubtedly be caught very soon.

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
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
