HARRY K. THAW WILL RECOVER FROM SELF INFLICKED WOUNDS

(By Associated Press.) PHILADELPHIA, Jan. 12.—Harry K. Thaw will be able to leave the hospital in two weeks unless he swallowed poison tablets such as were found in his pockets, according to his physician.

Thaw, under guard of a nurse and two detectives, slept well. His mind is somewhat hazy, as though the after effects of a drug and liquor.

Thaw's family is to confer to determine how to combat the New York charges. Private detectives say the Gump charges are looked upon as an attempt at blackmail.

Harry Thaw's attempt at self destruction yesterday was a sensational climax to a hunt which began here on Tuesday. Through counsel in Pittsburgh and New York, Thaw had made arrangements with a private detective in this city, acting for the Thaw interests in Pittsburgh, to surrender himself to District Attorney Swan in New York after preliminary matters had been formally undertaken with local authorities.

Thaw regarded the Gump charges, on which three indictments charging him with kidnaping and assault, as an attempt to blackmail him, the detective said.

Thaw gashed himself with a razor belonging to the husband of Mrs. Elizabeth Tacot, in whose home he was known as "Mr. West." He had been there since last Tuesday, when news of the indictments and the issuance of a bench warrant in New York became known.

SEARCHING FOR LOST AVIATORS

(By Associated Press.) SAN DIEGO, Jan. 12.—On receipt of a message from immigration officials at Calexico saying an aeroplane had been seen in flight yesterday noon by a Mexican about 30 miles below the Mexican border, Colonel W. A. Glasford, commandant of the army aviation school here, expressed the opinion that Lieutenant Colonel Bishop and Lieutenant Robertson probably were lost in the Volcano lake region of Lower California. The country there is a desolate waste.

Mexican cavalrymen from the garrison at Mexicali, opposite Calexico, were sent out to search for the lost aviators. Ranchers also are expected to aid.

The search will be continued as it is feared the aviators may be suffering from exposure and lack of food and water.

Whatever efforts are made to determine the fate of Bishop and Robertson will be directed by Major Burton from Calexico. If the war department authorities, and permission is secured from Governor Cantu of Lower California, airplanes may be sent over the localities where the airmen are possibly lost.

EXPLOSION OCCURED IN CLEARING HOUSE

(Continued from page one) The first which led to the disaster in the explosive factory started in what was known as building No. 30, where shells were being cleaned with denatured alcohol. The most generally accepted theory is that electric wires on the ceiling became crossed and a piece of blazing insulation fell into the alcohol. A high northwest wind caused the flash to spread rapidly through the flimsy structures that made up the plant.

The flames leaped from building to building, where were filled with shells awaiting shipment. There was a continuous roar as the flaming missiles flew high into the air and exploded. Soon the entire 80 acres which the plant occupied seemed to be covered with a sheet of flames. Dense black smoke covered the countryside for miles.

Buildings within a radius of two miles were shaken and almost all their windows were shattered. Many structures were badly damaged by falling shells and several were set on fire.

There was a literal reign of terror throughout Union township, in which the plant is situated. Sheriff's deputies and police from Kingsland, Lyndhurst, Rutherford, East Rutherford and other places surrounded the plant and gradually spread out for a distance of two miles in all directions, warning the residents of their peril.

Within an hour after the fire started the highways were filled with refugees, men, women and children. Many of the women carried babies in their arms, while others pushed baby carriages.
