BANK IN MEXICO MAKES A LOAN

RATE OF EXCHANGE FOR AMERICAN GOLD OFFICIALLY ESTABLISHED

(By Associated Press.) MEXICO CITY, Jan. 22.—The Bank of London and Mexico has arranged to loan to the government 3,000,000 pesos, American gold coins, it is announced, will be accepted by the government on the basis of one peso, 95 cents Mexican, per dollar, or a discount of 2 1/2 per cent, but that the rate on American paper money will continue to be a peso and 8 cents, or ten per cent discount. There are few, if any, American gold coins in Mexico.

FRANCE PREPARING FOR WAR AFTER WAR

PLANS FOR ENLARGEMENT OF INDUSTRIAL PLANTS ARE UNDER WAY

(By Associated Press.) NEW YORK, Jan. 21.—The American industrial commission to France has made public part of an extensive report it is to make to the American Manufacturers' Export association, dealing with the conditions which probably will confront the industries of France at the close of the war. The portion of the report made public said in part: "Even at this time, with the war raging, it was found that there is much reconstruction and new building ready to be undertaken. When peace comes the amount of construction of industrial plants generally will be larger both in France and Belgium."

WHIPPLE BUZZES ABOUT WALL ST. ON LEAK INQUIRY

(By Associated Press.) NEW YORK, Jan. 22.—Sherman Whipple is busy in the financial district today getting ready for the leak hearings. It is understood that probably the inquiry will be extended to investigation of the stock exchange. It is expected that expert accountants will be engaged to examine books got hold of.

PARIS TO CLOSE ALL CANDYSHOPS

(By Associated Press.) PARIS, Jan. 22.—Sugar cards are to be instituted in France. Their introduction in Paris and the department of the Seine will be accompanied with a census with a view of making the measure effectual. It is officially stated that the objects of the measure are to diminish the sea transport, reduce purchases abroad and revise the export of gold. The government also has decided that after February 1 all confectionery establishments must close Tuesday and Wednesday of each week, except holidays. During these two days the consumption is expressly forbidden of cakes, tarts and candies in confectionery and bread shops, hotels, cafes and groceries.

MEETS AND DEFEATS BAND OF VILLISTAS

(By Associated Press.) CHIHUAHUA CITY, Jan. 22.—Gen. Francisco Murguía received a military dispatch today from Gen. J. Hernandez, who is in command of the de facto forces in the Parral district, saying his forces had met and defeated a band of Villa followers at Rancho El Eguaje, near Parral, killing a number of the Villa followers, including Bibiano Contreras. Gen. Juan Carrasco, one of Gen. Manuel Dieguez' commanders, who left Torreón with a column of 2000 troops, has reached Jimenez and will garrison Santa Rosalia and Parral, relieving forces to take the field against Villa. Gen. Murguía announced. Villa was reported Thursday at La Juna, a small railroad station on the Mexico Northwestern railroad, 100 miles west of Chihuahua.

WESTERN SENATORS INSTRUCT PRESIDENT

(By Associated Press.) WASHINGTON, Jan. 22.—Senators Pittman, Phelan, Meyers and Walsh told the president this afternoon that unless the navy department compromise oil lands legislation affecting California and Wyoming the entire conservation program of the administration will be held up. They said the navy's attitude was not fair.

WILL PROCEED NOW WITH NEW CHURCH

CATHOLIC PASTOR ANNOUNCES RESULT OF CONFERENCE WITH BISHOP

Father Diss returned yesterday morning from Salt Lake, where he went to consult Bishop Glass on parish matters. This includes building a new church, which will be planned at once, and the construction left in the hands of the pastor. Father Diss announced yesterday that he wished to correct a false impression obtaining in Tonopah to the effect that all moneys raised in this parish went to Salt Lake. The only money transmitted to the bishop, the pastor explained, is the annual "cathedralium," or the regular tax against each church in the diocese for support of the bishop. This tax for St. Patrick's church amounts to \$100 per annum. Father Diss also said that hereafter he would make a personal call on the members of his congregation, as a change in the house arrangements enabled him to go out more frequently without risk of missing sick calls.

DIVIDEND DECLARED BY CORPORATION BANK

The annual meeting of the Tonopah Banking corporation was held Saturday. The following directors were elected for the ensuing year: H. C. Brougher, W. Brougher, R. B. Govan, Clyde A. Heller, Hugh H. Brown and John M. Gregory. The regular semi-annual dividend of \$6 per share, being dividend No. 16, was paid, which, with the dividend of same amount paid in July last, makes a disbursement of 12 per cent per annum to the shareholders.

OLD PIONEER INSANE

Harry Clark, an old pioneer of Tonopah, who has for several years been residing at Las Vegas, was taken to the insane asylum this morning. He was under the care of Parley Wheeler, an attendant at the institution. Mr. Clark has been suffering from mental aberration for some time, but it is hoped and expected that under skilled care his recovery will be complete. Clark was a commercial traveler for a number of years and at one time was proprietor of the Original Package in Tonopah.

BELGIUM NEEDS \$15,000,000

RELIEF WORK URGED TO KEEP ELEVEN MILLIONS ALIVE

(By Associated Press.) NEW YORK, Jan. 22.—The American commission for relief in Belgium is preparing for at least another year's work, and the necessity of raising approximately \$15,000,000 more will be discussed by the officials of the company here this week, according to Herbert C. Hoover, chairman, who has arrived from Liverpool. Mr. Hoover declined to discuss the deportation of Belgians by the Germans. He said there now are approximately 11,000,000 persons in Belgium and northern France, dependent upon the commission. The giving of an extra meal, consisting of meat hash and bread, to 250,000 Belgian school children, was the greatest accomplishment of the American commission for Belgian relief, in the opinion of Chairman Herbert C. Hoover, who is devising relief plans for another year. Many children have been kept from school, their parents fearing they would go hungry. It is estimated that 5,500,000 are destitute in Belgium and 2,000,000 in France. It will take \$150,000,000 to carry on the work another year.

"The situation is far worse than it has been at any time since the war," Hoover said, "as a result of the steady degeneration among the people. Only a negligible amount of business is transacted in Belgium and intellectual life is at a standstill. Universities are closed and the professors either scattered or have given their lives for their country."

GERMAN ATTACKS REPELLED BY STRONG FRENCH FIRE

(By Associated Press.) PARIS, Jan. 22.—French fire drove back two attacks by Germans on the Verdun front on the right bank of the Meuse.
