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MEMORABLE MONTH IN AMERICAN HISTORY

NOT another month in the calendar has so many momentous events to its credit than the present month of February, which adds another through the breaking off of diplomatic relations with Germany. This is a month replete with most inspiring reminiscences that should stimulate thoughts of patriotism on every side.

On the fifteenth of February the battleship Maine was blown up in Havana harbor and the incident was employed by this government to assist in teaching European powers that the United States stands on this continent as the guardian of liberty and the emancipator of an oppressed people.

One week later appears the red letter day marking the birth of the father of the country, on the 22nd, whose inspired utterances stand today as doctrines that would have saved the United States from all possible conflict had they been adhered to.

PAYING INDEMNITY TO GERMANY

CREW OF THE HOUSATONIC WARNED BY COMMANDER OF SUBMARINE

LONDON, Feb. 5.—The crew of the American steamship Housatonic has been landed at Penzance, England. The Housatonic was warned by the German submarine which sank her, according to John G. Stevens, American consul at Plymouth.

When hailed by the submarine the Housatonic was flying the American flag and had the American colors painted on her side, says a dispatch to the Central News. The crew was given an hour in which to leave the ship, the submarine commander saying: "I have orders to sink every vessel coming to England."
