ABOLISH OFFICE OF LABOR COMMISSIONER

SPECIAL TO THE BONANZA. CARSON CITY, Mar. 2.—After a spirited debate in the senate yesterday between Senators Harrington and Bradshaw, the senate passed the Bradshaw bill abolishing the office of state labor commissioner.

The vote was ten to seven. Harrington said that to abolish the office would be a direct slap at labor; Bradshaw said that there was no general demand for the bill.

The assembly killed the senate bill carrying an appropriation to take care of a deficiency in the fund for the manufacture of the silver service presented by the state to the battleship Nevada.

The Nye county delegation introduced a bill fixing salaries of justices of the peace of Nye county. The Tonopah justice is to get \$1800 per year; Manhattan \$1200; Round Mountain \$600; others on a fee system.

The senate passed an amendment to the statute defining murder restoring the old definition of murder in the first degree, which, in effect, restores the capital punishment clause.

Hesson's resolution providing for sessions of the federal court at Reno, Winnemucca, Elko, Ely, Tonopah or Goldfield was passed by the senate.

DEATH OF SHERIFF QUIRK, FORMER BOSS OF COMSTOCK

James Quirk, formerly for 14 years sheriff and assessor of Storey county, and for two terms justice of the peace, passed away Wednesday morning at the hospital, where he had been under treatment for some time past.

Mr. Quirk was a native of LaSalle county, Illinois, where he was born June 11, 1843. In 1863 he left Illinois for Montana, being one of the early miners at the famous Adler Gulch, where Virginia City, Montana, now stands.

In 1876 he went to the Black Hills, prospecting in the Wind River valley. He was on the Custer battle field before the soldiers had been buried and his party had several skirmishes with the Indians.

He came to Virginia City, Nevada, in the early days, and was a shift boss at the Yellow Jacket mine, his brother, Thomas Quirk, being foreman at the time. Later on he was foreman at the Jacket under the late Superintendent James H. Kinkead.

MINER BURIED IN SNOWSLIDE

Matt Angelo, an employe of the General mines in Lewis canyon, was caught and buried in a snowslide last Friday. The body is covered by 20 feet of snow and has not been found.—Virginia City Chronicle.
