ARMISTICE IN CUBA WILL BE ARRANGED

SPARE DEAL AND FAIR COURT OF THE ELECTION RETURNS GUARANTEED

(By Associated Press.) NEW YORK, Mar. 6.—Immediate suspension of hostilities by the Cuban revolutionists in the province of Oriente to be effected by a proclamation signed by representatives of the Liberal party and the commander of the American naval squadron at Santiago and followed by an armistice throughout the entire republic is forecasted in cablesgrams received by Dr. Orestes Ferrara.

By this turn of event, the Liberals will receive a guarantee, through the United States government, of fair elections in Oriente, the recognition of Fernandez as military commander of the province, and an assurance that the Menocal government shall not interfere with the Liberals in their present administration of affairs in the territory they hold.

PLOT TO INVAD INDIA VIA CHINA

ANOTHER INTERNATIONAL CONSPIRACY FOMENTED BY GERMAN INTERESTS

(By Associated Press.) NEW YORK, Mar. 6.—Dr. Chandra Chakiaberty, a Hindu physician, and Dr. Ernest Eckener, aged 34, described as a German, were arrested today charged with conspiring to set up a military expedition against a foreign country on friendly relations with the United States. The police say the prisoners confessed they plotted under direction of Wolf von Igel to invade India by the way of China. Von Igel is returning with von Bernstorff, having been indicted but not tried for complicity in a plot to destroy the Welland Canal. Chakiaberty and Eckener received \$50,000 from von Igel. The Hindu went to Berlin under a fraudulently obtained passport, informed the officials of his plan, and returned. Then he sent influential Chinamen to China to arrange to store arms and ammunition shipped from the United States, until time for the invasion.

FILIPINOS OWN MANILA RAILROAD

FIRST GOVERNMENT LINE OWNED AND OPERATED ON THE ISLANDS

(By Associated Press.) MANILA, Mar. 6.—Eugene E. Reed, former Congressman from New Hampshire, and one of the Democratic leaders of that state, has been named as president of the Manila Railroad company, transfer of which from the stockholders to the Philippine government was completed recently. Mr. Reed thus steps from the Philippine Commission, where he had held the post of secretary of commerce and police until the reorganization of the executive departments of the government finally abolished that body, to be the first head of the railroad system under government control.

This appointment came immediately after the cabled announcement that the money gained from an issue of \$4,000,000 worth of Philippine government bonds, purchased in October of last year by the National City company, had been paid over to the stockholders of the old Manila Railroad company by Clyde A. DeWitt, former public utility commissioner in the Philippines, who has spent the better part of a year in the United States, arranging the final details of the transfer. Mr. DeWitt, under government control of the railroad, becomes legal representative in the United States, of the railroad.

It is understood that the new \$1 and \$2 greenbacks are even harder to get than the old ones.—Los Angeles Times.

NEW GOLD CAMP NORTH OF INDIAN SPRINGS

George Lewis, one of the most extensive ranchers in the Sunnyside country, motored to Ely during the week, bringing many specimens of gold ore recently discovered in a new district about 130 miles southwest of Sunnyside, according to the Ely Record. The discovery was originally made by Harry Lewis last winter, who put in some time there bringing out many specimens which panned well in gold and some of these showing free gold to the naked eye. Recently assays have been made running as high as \$130 per ton in gold.

The district is situated about 20 miles north of Indian Springs on the Las Vegas and Tonopah railroad, and about 20 miles south of the flourishing camp of Groom, from which considerable ore is now being shipped. At the present time there is considerable snow water in the country, but during the dry season the nearest developed water at the present time is 12 miles distant from the camp.
