

# SECRETS OF UNDERSEA TRAPS GIVEN THE NAVY

(By Associated Press.)  
WASHINGTON, D. C., April 4.—All the closely guarded secrets of submarine catching devices of the entire navy are expected to come into possession of the American navy now that the United States is ready to enter the war.

In a general way it is known that by means of nets, airplanes, trawlers and swift submarine chasers, the British navy has gathered in many German submarines—the estimates in some cases have been placed as high as 300. During the first month of the campaign of ruthlessness it was reliably reported here that the entire chaser took 20 submarines in their bag. As the capacity of German navy yards, now that a standard of construction has developed, is said to be two submarines a week, the suppression of the campaign would seem to depend only

on development of efficiency in submarine catching. American officials consider the speedy development of a submarine defense is the first essential of the situation and all the genius and ability of the navy will be devoted to that end. They take for granted that Germany will not wait for aggressive action by the United States but will seek to terrorize America by sending submarines to bombard coast towns and raid shipping on this side of the Atlantic.

It is realized that in withdrawing submarines from the proscribed zone about the British Isles and France, Germany will weaken the avowed object of the ruthless campaign—the starvation blockade of England.

Nevertheless the possibility of submarine operations at the doors of the United States are being taken into the reckoning and preparations are being made to meet it.

# PEACE OFFERING OF THE DUAL MONARCHY

LONDON, April 4.—The Berlin Lokal Anzeiger's article concerning the proposal of the Austria-Hungarian foreign minister that a peace conference be held by the belligerents as reproduced by the Rheinische Westfälische Zeitung, of Essen, a copy of which has been received here, says:

"The standpoint taken by the Berlin and Vienna papers is shared by the governing circles of Sofia and Constantinople and shortly be given fresh emphasis by a visit to Germany of a highly placed personage from the dual monarchy."

"More unbroken and more firmly we stand on all fronts and more conscious do we feel of our power to persist to the end; better are we able with head erect to offer our enemies a peace worth for all parties for the immense sacrifices they have made in this war."

"Should our enemies now show themselves unwilling to grasp this opportunity for preparing to end the bloodshed and for restoring peace to the peoples of Europe, they will act on their own responsibility. We are prepared to continue to hold out. On that there is only one opinion in our quadruple alliance."

# SPIES GAIN ACCESS TO PRIVATE OFFICES

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 4.—The significance of President Wilson's warning of German spies "even in our offices of government," became apparent today when it was learned that on several occasions trails of the German secret service have been discovered within some of the most closely guarded precincts of the executive departments.

Although officials do not believe that access has been gained by the foreign agents to any information of great importance, they are convinced that not even the state department has been free from invasion.

No evidence on which prosecutions can be based has been found, it is

said, but enough has been revealed to prompt precautions. In his address to Congress the president laid particular stress on the activities of German spies and a stringent spy law will be one of the first war measures required of Congress by the administration. At the last session an espionage bill was passed by the senate, but failed to reach a vote in the house. Since the war began the justice department's bureau of investigation charged with the prosecution of foreign agents and disloyal citizens has been enlarged several times. It now is expected to be given much wider facilities and power to become an increasingly important part of the federal government.

# NO BONE DRY LAW FOR NEBRASKANS

DRASTIC TERMS OF BILL MODIFIED AND THEN GOES TO CONFERENCE

LINCOLN, Neb., April 4.—The state senate today passed by a vote of 18 to 14 the house prohibition bill, after amending it so materially as to make what was intended as a "bone dry" law one giving a large latitude in the use of intoxicants in the state, which becomes prohibition after May 1. By the senate amendments householders are permitted to store an unlimited supply of liquors for future use and are allowed to give it away. Manufacture and sale of near-beer is permitted and while no specific permission is given to clubs and societies to keep supplies, no penalty is provided for its presence in these club houses. The bill will go to conference and an effort is being made to effect a compromise between the two houses.

# INCENDIARIES BURN BRIDGES IN TEXAS

SOUTHERN PACIFIC SUFFERS FROM THREE FIRES IN TEN DAYS

LOCKHART, Texas, April 4.—The burning of a bridge on the Southern Pacific railroad near Waelder, Texas, late yesterday, tied up traffic on the San Antonio-Houston division of that road. This is the third bridge burned on that division during the last ten days. Railroad officials believe the fires were incendiary.

## IMPORTANT NOTICE TO SECRETARIES

Your attention is called to the following extract from the Nevada Statutes: Chapter XVIII, Nevada Statutes, 1901: Amended Statute, 1913, Chapter 194:

Section 1. All foreign corporations doing business in the State of Nevada shall, not later than the month of March in each year, beginning in the year 1914, publish a statement of their last year's business in some newspaper published in the State of Nevada. If published in a daily newspaper, such statement shall be published for a period of one week, or if published in a semi-weekly or tri-weekly newspaper, for a period of two weeks; or if published in a weekly newspaper for a period of four weeks.

The penalty for not complying with the above law is a fine of \$100 for each month that the published statement remains unfiled with the several assessors of the state.
