ALLIES LAUNCH GREAT OFFENSIVE IN MACEDONIA

Fresh Chapter of Carnage Begins Along a Front of 100 Miles

ITALY SINKS 13 AUSTRIAN SUBMARINES UNDER SEAS

SUBMARINES IN ADRIATIC SUFFER AND FOUR TRANS-PORTS ARE SUNK

(By Associated Press.) WASHINGTON, D. C., May 11.—Advices to the Italian embassy says 13 Austrian submarines have been sunk in the Adriatic by Italian patrol within a week. Italian destroyers have penetrated the fortified port of Durazzo, sinking four transports loaded with provisions and munitions.

CLARENCE MACKAY PRESENTS COLORS

GALLANT SON OF COMSTOCK IMPRESSES PATRIOTISM ON AMERICANS

(By Associated Press.) PARIS, May 11.—An impressive ceremony took place at Passy yesterday when American flags, presented by Clarence H. Mackay, of New York, were given to the American units who are proceeding to the front. The ceremony was attended by William Graves Sharpe, the American ambassador, and a large number of French officials and members of the American colony.

MORE REPRESENTATIVES FOR THE REICHSTAG

GERMAN GOVERNMENT WILL AGREE TO REDISTRICTING OF THE EMPIRE

(By Associated Press.) COPENHAGEN, May 11.—A dispatch from Berlin says the German government has indicated its intention to submit to the full redistricting of the reichstag districts. This would meet one of the most widely urged demands for reform and give modern Germany a more adequate representation in parliament, the members of which are still elected on the basis of the population of 1870.

COAL CARDS ISSUED TO PEOPLE OF MUNICH

(By Associated Press.) BERNE, May 11.—Munich has introduced coal cards as a result of the famine during the winter that necessitated the closing of the theaters. The cards entitle each household to 100 pounds of coal weekly.

NO BOXING IN NEW YORK

SPREADS ALARM OF A SUBMARINE

BRITISH STEAMER SEEKS REFUGE FROM ATTACK IN MAINE PORT

(By Associated Press.) ROCKLAND, Me., May 11.—An unverified rumor of the presence of a submarine off the New England coast was circulated here after a British merchant steamer had put into this harbor unexpectedly. The captain of the vessel came ashore and called upon the local naval representative, but the subject of the conference was not made known.

CHINA WILL NOT ENTER THE WAR

AFTER A RIOTOUS SESSION PARLIAMENT GOES ON RECORD IN FAVOR OF PEACE

(By Associated Press.) PEKING, China, May 11.—After a riotous session lasting through Thursday night the house of representatives refused to pass a resolution declaring war on Germany. Parliament was surrounded by a mob demanding war, and threatening violence. Premier Tuan Chi Jui, who urged war, was denounced by the members, claiming he was attempting to coerce them. The press opposes war.

AMALGAMATED MILL STARTS UP MONDAY

The mill of the Union Amalgamated Mining company at Manhattan will start up Monday morning on company account reducing ore taken from the rich strike in the east drift which continues to sample an average of \$60 for a width of six feet. The ore on the west drift is of lower grade, but still of good milling value. The mill has a capacity of 50 tons daily and there is enough ore in sight to keep the stamps dropping indefinitely.

BELL HOP SUSPECTED OF MURDER IN ST. PAUL

(By Associated Press.) SAN FRANCISCO, May 11.—The police received word from St. Paul that E. H. Hamilton, alias Harry Lux, aged 19, bell-boy, arrested here with Pearl White Camp and two other bell boys, is wanted there in connection with the murder of Mrs. Alice Mcquillan Dunn two weeks ago.

BIG ADVANCE IN POWDER TAKES EFFECT AT ONCE

The mine operators were notified today that the price of powder has been advanced from 17 1/2 cents to 20 cents a pound, f. o. b. San Francisco. This makes a difference of \$45 a ton. The enhancement is ascribed to the difficulty of securing deliveries of glycerine owing to war demands absorbing the supply.

ENEMY STRIKE HARD AT INVADERS BAD REPORTS FROM PETROGRAD AUSTRIA CHAFING OVER ORDERS

(By Associated Press.) DATELESS.—The Allies opened a great offensive on the Macedonian front from Monastir to Lake Dorian, 100 miles, with bitter fighting at a bend of the Cerna river, in the neighborhood of Vardar. The deadlock in France continues, but the allies are massing men behind the lines for a tremendous blow.

(By Associated Press.) The expected general offensive along the Macedonian front apparently has been started with vigor. From Lake Ochrid eastward to the region about Lake Doiran, numerous big battles are in progress, with the entente allies the aggressors.

WHEAT WILL BE FIVE DOLLARS BUSHEL, WITHOUT RESTRICTION

(By Associated Press.) NEW YORK, May 11.—Herbert C. Hoover, says that without control we may see flour at \$20 a barrel before the year is over, but that with control, "the present price of flour can be reduced 40 to 50 per cent and at the same time the producer be treated in a liberal manner."

FELIX DIAZ SLAIN BY REBEL LEADER

NEPHEW OF FORMER DICTATOR OF MEXICO IS SHOT AND KILLED

EL PASO, May 11.—A Mexican arriving from the south told secret service officials that General Felix Diaz, nephew of the late Porfirio, former president, had been shot and killed by General Callmaror, former Zapata commander, following a dispute as to the supreme command of the revolutionists at Oaxaca.

TWO NIPPON SHIPS AT SAN FRANCISCO

CADETS ON A TRAINING CRUISE WILL BE ENTERTAINED WHILE IN PORT

(By Associated Press.) SAN FRANCISCO, May 11.—Two Japanese training ships have arrived at a Pacific coast port in the course of a training cruise. The naval cadets and officers will be entertained by army and navy officers.

(By Associated Press.) WASHINGTON, D. C., May 11.—Secretary Lansing declared today that there is no agreement with the allies that the United States could not accept a separate peace. The coming peace proposal by the Chancellor brought the question.

SINKING TWO SHIPS IN SPANISH WATERS

(By Associated Press.) LONDON, May 11.—The Norwegian steamers Tiger and Leikanger were sunk ten miles off the northwest coast of Spain. It is reported that a German submarine halted the steamers in Spanish waters and escorted them beyond territorial limits, where they were sunk. Both ships were engaged in the American trade.

MANHATTAN CON. IS IN HARDEST ROCK

The work of cutting the station on the 312 level has been completed and the crosscut is being extended from the face at a distance of 15 feet from the shaft. There was a short delay in finishing the station owing to a small mudslide which called for timbering, but this section has been passed and the drills are now in the hardest kind of rock with conditions very favorable for getting ore soon.

Duncan, of the American Federation of Labor, and Charles Edward Russell, author and Socialist.

REPAIRS TO NEW YORK CITY HALL UNDER WAY

(By Associated Press.) NEW YORK, May 11.—The damage to the city hall is estimated at \$25,000. An hour and a half after the fire was out workmen were putting the building in shape for the reception of the British commission today. The ruined clock tower was covered with bunting.

OBJECTING TO DUNNE FOR TRIAL

MRS. MOONEY SEEKS TO HAVE JUDGE FRANK DUNNE DISQUALIFIED

(By Associated Press.) SAN FRANCISCO, May 11.—Maxwell McNutt, attorney for Mrs. Rena Mooney, charged with murder in the preparedness bomb case, filed a motion to disqualify Judge Frank Dunne from presiding at the trial beginning Monday. He claims that utterances of the judge on April 30th when he declared that "Billings was justly and properly convicted, and committed perjury so palpable and plain that it would not have deceived a jury of children," demonstrated the judge's bias.

TRUE REASON FOR ADVANCING RATES

RAILROAD EARNINGS WILL BE REDUCED BY HANDLING GOVERNMENT BUSINESS

(By Associated Press.) WASHINGTON, D. C., May 11.—Julius Kruttschnitt, chairman of the Southern Pacific, told the interstate commerce commission in hearings of the railroad's application for 15 per cent higher freight rates, that the immediate reason for the increase is that the railroad soon will be called on to carry great quantities of military supplies and troops at government rates, lower than commercial rates.

BREAD IN SAN FRANCISCO IS SHARPLY ADVANCED

(By Associated Press.) SAN FRANCISCO, May 11.—Beginning May 14th bread will advance to 7 1/2 cents for a 12-ounce loaf now selling at six cents, and 15 cents for a 24-ounce loaf now selling for 12 cents.
