ESPIONAGE BILL MAY COME TO VOTE IN SENATE THIS EVENING

(By Associated Press.) WASHINGTON, D. C., May 11.—Debate on the administration espionage bill, whose press censorship and embargo provisions have been the object of bitter attack for nearly ten days, reached a point yesterday where the leaders were hopeful a vote can be taken before tonight's adjournment. Many speeches are yet to be made on the censorship section but the senate bound itself to limit debate so that no filibuster or dilatory tactics can delay the final roll call.

Just before adjournment last night Senators Cummins and Thomas suggested an amendment to the censorship section modifying the original language and it was accepted by Senator Overman in charge of the bill, who said it would go into the measure. It's adoption may end the fight over this provision, although Senator Stone announced he did not want it accepted and efforts may be made to eliminate any sort of censorship from the measure.

The amendment provides that in time of war the president may prescribe and promulgate rules and regulations "for the purpose of preventing the disclosure to the public and thereby to the enemy, of information with respect to the movement, numbers, descriptions and disposition of any of the armed forces of the United States in naval or military operations, or with respect to any works intended for the fortification and defense of any place."

Most of yesterday's debate centered about regulation to be imposed upon use of the mails. Amendments were adopted prohibiting the opening of mail by any postal employe, except in the dead letter office and declaring non-mailable any publication containing matter advocating or urging treason, insurrection or forcible resistance of any law of the United States.

Referring to the petition of the railroads for a general 15 per cent freight rate, Mr. Kitchin continued: "We will have plenty of chances to get some of that back for the American people in the way of taxes. If the railroads are permitted to raise their freight rates 15 per cent of their gross receipts, I am willing to come in here with a tax bill and tell them to pay some of that to help support the government."

Defending the bill's proposal to advance postal rates, Mr. Kitchin declares that it costs the government \$100,000,000 a year to carry and handle second class matter, and it gets back only \$11,000,000. The proposed increase, he said, will bring in \$31,000,000.

Without any form of control we are likely to see an even worse situation than the higher prices prevailing, resulting from the unrestrained drain on our wheat abroad. It is possible that the last three months of next year we may be bare of breadstuffs in this country.

"Food control does not mean bread cards to the American people. It means the broad conservation of our food, the better handling by elimination of waste and speculation. With proper control for America, the government would ask only one thing from the individual consumer, that he eat plenty, but wisely, and waste nothing and if democracy is a faith worth defending, our people will do this service voluntarily and willingly.

"Hoarding and speculation are rife, yet there can be no particle of a doubt that we have in North America today a surplus of from 50,000,000 to 70,000,000 bushels of wheat beyond our ordinary consumption and beyond the needs of our allies before the next harvest comes in. Out of the next harvest, with no economy in consumption, North America, even with the loss in winter wheat, can give our allies 400,000,000 bushels of cereals of one kind or another.

"But to protect our consumers from today and legitimately expand our exports to our allies, without breaking into our own necessary food, the government must have widest and absolutely immediate powers. Time is the essence of the matter. No European government except Germany was able to secure these powers until after some disaster was irrevocable, and we sit here dumbly waiting for disaster and then we shall scream and criticize the government for not having done something that they are powerless to do."
