RED CROSS WANTS HUNDRED MILLIONS

URGENT NEED OF FUNDS TO PROVIDE FOR THE CARE OF OUR ALLIES

(By Associated Press.) WASHINGTON, D. C., May 25.—The greatest campaign the Red Cross has waged, designed to raise \$100,000,000 to care for American soldiers, was launched here at a meeting of representatives of the larger cities.

Henry P. Davidson, chairman of the Red Cross war council announcing the amount to be raised, said it is certain \$100,000,000 will be required, "even to approach compliance with the most pressing needs."
