OLD MACHINERY IN ACTIVE DEMAND

A small advertisement in the Bonanza brought in a crowd of prospective buyers who bid freely for whatever part of the material they could secure. MONUMENT AT DONNER LAKE TO COMMEMORATE PIONEER PARTY

(By Associated Press.) TRUCKEE, Cal., May 25.—Contracts are being let for the installation of the great monument at Donner lake, three miles from here, promoted by the Native Sons of the Golden West, as a memorial to the ill-fated Donner party. One thousand sacks of cement will be required for the pedestal, which will be 22 feet in height. This will support a bronze group of a man, woman and child, having an additional height of 2 1/2 feet.

Although destined to stand in an isolated spot, the monument will be in plain view of travelers on the Southern Pacific railroad, the line of which is on the bluff a mile distant. A broad vista will be maintained through the forest.

Dr. C. W. Chapman, of Nevada City, chairman of the committee, has devoted nearly 20 years to the monument movement. Largely through his efforts the following sums have been contributed:

Molybdenite Property Sold Under a Bond and Lease
