

# TEN MILLION YOUNG AMERICANS WILL BE REGISTERED TOMORROW

 WASHINGTON, June 4.—Final preparations for the registration of more than ten million young Americans tomorrow for war service and for the prosecution of the disloyal who attempt to interfere with the registration went forward Sunday and today at the offices of Brigadier General Crowder, provost marshal general, and Attorney General Gregory.

Into the office of General Crowder will come the reports of the state officials who are conducting the military census. Probably by midnight Tuesday it will be possible to state with approximate accuracy the number of men who have presented themselves during the hours of registration. A week later the lists of the registrars will have reached Washington and further analysis will be possible.

Reports to the justice department give further proof of the strict enforcement of the law forbidding interference with the process of registration. At the request of an army recruiting officer a man was arrested in Hagerstown, Md., for distributing literature urging resistance of the new army law. Eleven others were taken into custody on similar charges yesterday at Cincinnati by department of justice officials.

"I anticipate no resort to force to prevent registration," Attorney General Gregory said, in a statement. "If any individual should attempt it he will be promptly dealt with."

"In almost every community there will be persons who will attempt to evade registration. One class will consist of weaklings who lack the physical and moral courage necessary to face the possibility of a fight, and another of those under the influence of men and women beyond the conscription age who are endeavoring to dissuade young men from registering. Some of the people exerting this influence are wholly disloyal; others are lacking in patriotism or an appreciation of the needs of the country and are animated by a fear of the possible loss of members of these families."

"The young men of the country who came within the provisions of the conscription act are brave and inherently loyal. They are ready and willing in nearly every instance to answer to the nation's call and do their part in protecting it from a foreign foe."

"The registration law puts into effect a policy new to the present generation. It is to be expected that some individuals subject to the

law will attempt to evade it. To him who does not grasp the magnitude of the registration proposed the number who on June 5 appear to have failed to register may seem large. The failure of one man in one hundred to do so would make a considerable total. If the early returns show that the number registered does not equal the preliminary estimates it will not indicate that the law has not been generally obeyed.

"Those who attempt to evade will be promptly punished and compelled to perform the service required by the law. It is the duty of this department to prosecute these evaders and it is prepared to do so."

Officers of the national committee of patriotic and defense societies, issued today an appeal to the million and a half members of their organizations to carry out the spirit and the letter of the president's registration proclamation.

It was explained at the provost marshal general's office that men of Polish nativity subject to the registration act who were born in sections of Poland now held by Germany or Austria, should register on June 5 as natives of Poland claimed by Germany, or Austria, as the case may be, and not as Germans or Austrians.

# REDUCING NUMBER OF MILITARY CANTONMENTS

Important revisions in the plans for training the war army have been made by the war department, which announces that the half million men to be called to the colors in September will be concentrated in 16 cantonments instead of 32 and that many of the forces probably would be put into tents instead of wooden barracks. Lack of funds, material, labor and transportation facilities, Secretary Baker said, were determining influences in the decision to reduce the number of cantonments.

The previous plan to build 32 of the camps was reached, it was explained, after congress had appropriated \$77,000,000 on the theory that there would be only 16. For a time the larger number seemed practicable, but that would have made a much greater demand on the over-taxed resources at the department's command.

Although the change will upset all the tentative plans for camp locations made by the department commanders, it is not expected to delay beyond September 1 the mobilization of the great draft army. Four of the 16 camp sites provided for under the new plan already have been selected and choice of the others is expected soon. Secretary Baker indicated that building would proceed as rapidly as possible. The four sites selected are at American Lake, Washington; Atlanta, Ga.; Ayre, Mass.; and Wrighttown, N. J.

A more plentiful supply of canvas than expected made it possible to put some of the troops under tents. A canvas shortage was largely responsible for the original plan

to house the army in wooden barracks, for army officials have preferred tenting from the state. Most of the tents used probably will be placed at southern camps.

The task of building a cantonment is a big one. Miles of roads, water, sewer and light construction must be put in. More than 2000 buildings must be erected in each camp, and railway connections must be established. To begin simultaneous construction of 32 such cities, officials feel, would have been more than the resources of the department or of the country could have borne without seriously interrupting the ordinary course of commercial life.

# ONE ONLY UNITED AMERICA CAUSED BY GERMAN HOSTILITY

 BALTIMORE, June 4.—John Barrett, director general of the Pan-American Union, in a speech here yesterday before a Liberty Loan mass meeting, predicted that within a year all the Americas would be fighting together against Germany.

"If Brazil enters the conflict, as seems imminent," he said, "two-thirds of the entire population and five-eighths of the total area of the western hemisphere will be at war with the common enemy. Can the remaining one-third of population and three-eighths of area stand against the psychological, sympathetic and economic appeal of their sister peoples and countries having similar interests, similar instincts, similar government and similar destiny?"

"That the whole western hemis-

phere will be directly engaged in the war before another year passes is now not only possible, but very probable. Speaking unofficially, for no one can speak today in this crisis for all America, but basing conclusions upon the consistent attitude of the Latin-American press and the expressed opinions of Latin-American statesmen, it can be said, that despite the justifiable and even praiseworthy neutrality of some of the Latin-American countries there is no question whatever now that it looks like events would inevitably cause all of them to align themselves with the United States and its European allies and even take such steps as will be equal to a declaration of war."

"The preponderating public sentiment everywhere in Latin-America is

undoubtedly pro-American and pro-ally. The governments remaining neutral cannot be described as being in any way under German influence. It may be that it will be far better for the eventual best interests of the United States, Great Britain, France and Italy if they would remain neutral.

"Certain mighty and irresistible, but almost intangible forces and influences of both sentimental and economic character towards a break with Germany, are however, powerfully at work everywhere in Latin-America and cannot be checked. The tide of Pan-Americanism is undoubtedly rising with a new power and an opportunity to save world civilization and at this hour it looks as if the flood would carry all America with it."

# BRITISH SUBJECTS MAY PRESENT THEMSELVES AT U. S. STATIONS

 WASHINGTON, D. C., June 4.—Lieutenant General T. M. G. Bridges, who was the military head of the British mission to the United States has given to the Associated Press a statement explaining the enlistment of British subjects in the United States.

"There are large numbers of British subjects living in the United States who have been up to now unable to enlist as no machinery was available to handle them," said General Bridges. "I expect that they will now come forward in large numbers to do their duty by their country."

"Men between the ages of 18 and 45 desirous of enlisting in the Imperial or Canadian forces may present themselves at the United States recruiting depots where they will receive their preliminary examinations and be forwarded free of cost to British or Canadian depots."

"While affording this opportunity for voluntary enlistment, it must always be remembered that the law of nations does not recognize a 'man

without a country," and that every man who enjoys the privileges of citizenship has corresponding obligations to fulfill.

"It will be the object of both countries to ensure that there is no escape from these obligations. I consider that measures will be taken to this end. All men, therefore, should lose no time in selecting the branch of service to which they wish to be posted."

A supplemental statement by General White said:

"According to the 1910 census there were at that time 500,000 British and Canadian male subjects over 21 resident in this country who had not completed their naturalization. Accurate figures of men between the ages of 21 and 30 will be obtained through the medium of the registration for the selective draft."

"Any men found medically unfit on final examination at New York or at the Canadian depot will, of course, be returned at the expense of the British or Canadian government."

# SHOE CONTRACTS FOR THE MILLION

THE LARGEST CONTRACT FOR LEATHER EVER MADE BY GOVERNMENT

 WASHINGTON, D. C., June 4.—Contracts for 2,900,000 pairs of shoes for the army and 850,000 for the navy were awarded Saturday. The contracts represent the largest shoe purchase ever made by the government, their total value reaching nearly \$17,000,000.

Bidders submitted their estimates on the basis of options on vast quantities of leather secured some time ago by the defence council's committee on supplies, of which Julius Rosenwald is chairman. If they cannot purchase leather as cheaply direct, the committee on supplies will turn over the options to them. The main purpose in getting the options was to stabilize the leather market against heavy purchases for government account.

The army purchases include three styles of marching and field shoes. The navy buys the regular black calf skin high cut design. Firms awarded army contracts include the following, the amounts of the contracts not being announced: Brown Shoe company of St. Louis; International Shoe company of St. Louis; Weinberg Shoe company, of Milwaukee; A. H. Weinbronner company of Milwaukee; Hulskamp Brothers, of Keokuk, Iowa, and Hamilton-Brown Shoe company, St. Louis.

# GERMAN RATIONS CUT ONE THIRD

TWO MEATLESS DAYS IN THE TRENCHES OWING TO SHORT-AGE OF BEEF SUPPLY

 WITH THE BRITISH ARMIES IN FRANCE, Via London, June 1.—9:25 p. m.—The conditions as to food supplies in Germany may be conjectured from the fact that if now is definitely settled that the best fed of the German fighting units subsist on a ration which equals only three-fifths in weight and value that issued to the British troops. The best nourished German troops are those in reserve just back of the fighting lines. They receive the maximum ration. Since the spring of 1916, however, their bread allowance has been cut down one-third.
