CONSPIRACY TO KIDNAP MAKER OF MUNITIONS

SENSATIONAL DEVELOPMENT IN THE ABDUCTION OF THE KEETS BABY (By Associated Press.) SPRINGFIELD, Mo., June 6.—Plans to abduct a St. Louis munitions manufacturer as part of a German conspiracy to block the shipment of supplies, were revealed today to prosecuting Attorney O'Day by C. J. Pirsol, one of six men held in investigating the disappearance of Lloyd Keet, the fourteen months' old son of J. Holland Keet, a wealthy banker. The baby was kidnapped Wednesday and the police believe they are now on the trail of the abductors and hope the baby will be returned before night. One of the six men is said to have confessed.

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INVESTORS VISIT MANHATTAN TO EXAMINE RECENT STRIKES

Manhattan celebrated registration day by turning out en masse to promote the good cause and boost for the issuance of Liberty Bonds. The fine weather induced many capitalists from Tonopah to run over and spend the day inspecting their properties and finding out something about the latest developments. Among those who visited Manhattan during the day were Lester B. Mangum, representing the Jesse Knight interests of Salt Lake; John R. Miller and Engineer Witt, representing the Wingfield, Zanzibar and White Caps Extension companies; Zeb Kendall and R. B. Govan, of the Morning Glory; C. C. Boak, of the Manhattan Con.; Charles F. Wittenberg, Union Amalgamated; Richard P. Dunlap, Manhattan Verde and Louis K. Kootz, of the Mustang and Big Four. These men represent the big companies that are operating and pressing development as rapidly as money and men can do it. They have faith in the camp and are backing their faith with cold cash of their own and their friends. The chief interest was centered around the discoveries on the Wolfstone Extension mentioned in yesterday's Bonanza which extends the speculative area of the camp a considerable distance. Yesterday the company had panings across four and one-half feet with a streak of an inch and a half in jewelry. The strike was made in an open cut where Wolfstone Extension caught the foot of the blue lime peak below Mustang Hill where it meets with the float. Mustang has a rich dump of high grade ore out, some of which runs \$1200 to the ton. Most of this is a sulphide and an effort will be


made to run it in the Wittenberg mill. The ore from the Train & Chase lease has been sent through the War Eagle mill, but as that is not equipped with a cyaniding attachment it is unable to treat the sulphides. Tests are now being made and, if successful, the ore will go to the Wittenberg plant, where the segregated sulphides may be milled with the ore from the Union Amalgamated. Union Amalgamated has cut off one shift owing to the presence of gas which required more time to free the mine than could be done where the workings were continuously occupied. One shift was laid off ten days ago, but even with this decrease in the number of miners the bins at the mill and mine are kept clogged with ore. Manhattan Con. has turned the crosscut once more so as to run at right angles with the mud fissure and now is out 115 feet from the shaft. The company is looking for encouraging developments within the next three days. Morning Glory is in values that come close to the milling stage. When the change came in the shaft about a week ago the best assay ran one dollar. Then as sinking continued an improvement brought in returns of \$3 and yesterday it was reported that samples ran as high as \$8. White Caps Extension and Zanzibar will be operated as separate properties, although under the management of O. B. McCraney. Two shafts will be sunk, but the heavy work will not begin until after the White Caps road is finished. This will enable the companies to bring in their equipment at much less cost and de-

liver it in a better position than would be possible around the old road. Both companies expect to have forces at work by next Sunday.
