TAKE ABSOLUTE CONTROL OF FOOD

NO HALF WAY MEASURES WILL BE TOLERATED IN ENGLAND

(By Associated Press.) LONDON, June 18.—Invited only today to make a statement as to his intended policy as food controller, Baron Rhonda, president of the local government's board, told the press the government had given him ample powers, even should it be necessary to the extent of taking over the food supplies of the country and the adoption of strong measures to check all speculation in the necessities of life.
