SUBMARINE WARFARE IS SAD FIZZLE

FRENCH ADMIRAL SAYS GERMAN HAS PLAYED ITS LAST CARD

(By Associated Press.) PARIS, July 14.—Admiral Taczak, minister of marine, told the Associated Press that "the Germans have abandoned all hope of securing victory by arms, as their last resort tried was submarine warfare, proclaiming we would be on our knees in from four to six weeks. We are bringing four million tons weekly into the country, and ever month increases the certainty of our being able to repair our losses."
