

# KIDDIES SWIMMING POOL WILL BE IN THE CENTER OF BEAUTIFUL PARK

The kiddies swimming pool is going to be a real up to date plunge and swimming bath with concrete basin and all the trimmings that go to make such an institution popular with the younger element of the camp. Work was begun yesterday excavating for the pool but when Mr. and Mrs. John G. Kirchen learned that the committee was restricted in the work by limitation of funds they called a halt and instructed committee to take a better site and make the pool one of the best in the country. The idea

originated with Mr. and Mrs. Kirchen and they say they want to see their suggestion carried out in first class style. The committee was proceeding cautiously so as not to become involved in debt but Mr. Kirchen said he would stand sponsor for any deficiency that may arise after the contract is completed. The Tonopah Mine Operators have taken a lively interest in the plunge and, while they have not been heard from, as a association, the assurance has been given that they will not be stingy about their donation.

The site will be above Victor park and Mr. and Mrs. Kirchen propose to make the place much more attractive than was anticipated by extending the parked area which can be enlarged through an abundance of water available for irrigation. The new site will enable the engineers to provide for a daily flushing of the pond and improve the circulation of water so that no impurities will lodge. The excavation done yesterday will not cost more than \$20 so the committee has not lost anything by the change.
