Manhattan Con. has resumed sinking the main shaft to a depth of 400 feet from where work was left off two months ago at the 300-foot mark. The south crosscut which was driving to pick up the high grade vein was stopped after going out about 80 feet. The ground was found faulted to a considerable degree and the management deemed it best not to devote any more funds that could be done to much better advantage from below. After the 400 foot mark is reached it is proposed to come back and prospect to the mine. From the bottom two laterals will be run out while exploration is resumed on the 300 level.

SUDDEN DEATHS OF INYO RESIDENTS

Two residents of the county died suddenly the early part of the week, says the Inyo County Register. One was Granville W. Melone, the other John Henry Wichman.

G. W., known to all acquaintances as Henry Melone, dropped dead just outside of his home in Big Pine Monday. He had been an Inyoite, residing at Big Pine most of the time, for thirty years, and probably considerably longer. He was interested in mining claims near Fish Springs for many years. He was a Civil war veteran, having enlisted in the 49th Missouri regiment in April, 1864. John Henry Wichman fell dead in the road between his home and that of John E. Jones, in Round valley. He had been working in the field, and told the Indian who was with him that he was going to quit as he felt sick. Later, it appears, he started for the Jones place and fell in the road. He laid there for several hours, until finally a Plute told Foster Smith that he thought the man was sick as he still lay in the road. The deceased had farmed and done other work in Round valley and this neighborhood and in Mono at intervals for several years. He is survived by a brother, William Wichman.

LOSE TREASURES IN R. R. WRECK

PRECIOUS HEIRLOOMS AND WEDDING PRESENTS CONSUMED BY HAFED FIRE. Mr. and Mrs. Edward J. Haug lost all their belongings in the recent fire on the Southern Pacific at Hafed where two trains were in collision. The property of the Haugs represented by 51 packages was contained in a box car billed to Tonopah for transfer to Manhattan and would have been switched off the main line at Hazen in thirty minutes. The car contained all their wedding presents, the birth-day gifts of their first born, the furniture of their home in Reno and many keepsakes that had been accumulated by husband and wife. The loss cannot be estimated by money as little of it can be replaced.

HOARDING OF GOLD IS STOPPED BY TURKS

(Correspondence Associated Press) CAIRO, Egypt, July.—The paper money issued by the Turkish government is not popular in Palestine. Since its issue it has steadily declined in value, and the native of Palestine has an international reputation for discrimination in matters of finance, it is not easy to hoodwink the people as to the real worth of the greenback currency. The governor, Jemal Pasha, recently has issued some rather peculiar proclamations insisting that this rise in the local rate of exchange is due to "the evil practice of hoarding real money" and that therefore the practice of hoarding must cease. The proclamations declare that paper money and specie must and shall be equal in value, and to enforce this somewhat arbitrary adjustment of financial values, he state that: "If our hope to have this adjustment peaceably effected is disappointed, and if by the fifteenth instant articles of any kind, whether food or otherwise, cannot be purchased with paper at exactly the same rate as cash, I shall proceed to deport from the vilayets of Anatolia and Roumelia every tenth man with his family, of the persons specified above (local bankers, headmen and leading citizens). The selection will be made by lot. In the execution of this deportation no exception will be made in favor of the managers of Ottoman and German banks."

WILL RULE I. W. W. FROM RENO PARADE

ORDER OF LABOR FOR CELEBRATION SHOWS PRECAUTION AGAINST RADICALS. Precautionary steps to avoid a participation of the Industrial Workers of the World in the Labor day parade is indicated on the part of the union labor officials in an announcement made by the Reno Journal that only those invited and only those friendly to the union labor movement may participate in the parade of the day. "Strict supervision of the line will be maintained by the marshals and the police," said E. L. Parrish, secretary of the publicity committee, "and no display unfriendly to the union labor movement or to the friendly feeling and best interests of the people of Reno will be tolerated." Parrish refused to admit that the I. W. W. factor, which is regarded by all bodies organized under the American Federation of Labor as inimical to union labor, has influenced the unions in making the announcement. He said, however, that he had heard there were large numbers of the I. W. W. in and near Reno. Reports coming in from various sources indicate that Reno has about 130 I. W. W. members at the present time. The police are conducting a persistent campaign to compel them to leave town, four agitators having been arrested in Reno last week and compelled by a court ruling to leave town. The men had on their persons a variety of radical literature used in I. W. W. organization.

TO WHOM IT MAY CONCERN: It has been the policy of the Nye County Grand Jury to notify and thereby give all persons in violation of our sanitary laws ample time in which to comply therewith. While in many instances the said notification has been complied with, there are numerous persons who have disregarded the said order. Therefore, the Grand Jury through its Committee on Sanitation, once more hereby notifies all property owners and all persons maintaining public nuisances to immediately discontinue the same. On and after August 23rd, 1917, the District Attorney, Chief of Police and County Physician have been instructed to file complaints and vigorously prosecute all offenders of the hereinabove mentioned law.
