SUFFRAGE IS DEFEATED IN MAINE ELECTION

Two Merchant Ships Lost Without Loss of Life Convoy Left Unscathed

(By Associated Press.) WASHINGTON, Sept. 11.—American destroyers are believed to have sunk six hostile submarines off the coast of France September fifth while conveying a fleet of merchantmen from the United States.

The merchant fleet was en route to Europe from the United States under convoy, when attacked by six submarines. It is not known whether the two merchant ships were American.
