THIS IS NO CAPITALIST'S WAR.

IN DEFENSE of their treasonable propaganda German agents in this country masquerade as pacifists, friends of Ireland, and defenders of the rights of labor.

It is not Wall street capitalists but farmers and workmen who are getting more because we are at war. Farmers have received guarantees that wheat will not go below two dollars a bushel for two years and since April 6 last, when war was declared, they have received higher prices for cattle, hogs, eggs, dairy products, grains and cotton than have been recorded in forty years and in most cases since the settlement of the continent.

Farmers and workmen display determination to get the most they can out of this war and few of them will be reached by the federal tax collectors no matter how much their wages or profits may exceed the exempted income figures.

Neither is this "a poor man's fight." The rich and socially prominent are not only giving their money, but are doing their share of the fighting.

Let all Americans be fair in thought and speech and realize and acknowledge that all of us must do our part to win this war and that most of us are doing it to the best of our ability.

REVENUE BILL "JOKERS."

CONGRESS will have to revise the war revenue bill. As signed by the president it contains a couple of "jokers" that public opinion will not indorse.

Members of both houses who favored the highest possible taxation of incomes and profits professed to admire and follow the British system. The British government taxes incomes from investments more heavily than salaries and earnings.

The exemption granted by themselves to senators and representatives will not appeal to the most heavily taxed people on earth. If it should, the voters will pass judgment on it in November, 1919, before the recollection of their tax bills has faded from memory.

GOVERNMENT LAW REGARDING BIRDS

The anticipated changes in the federal migratory bird laws have been announced at Washington by the department of agriculture.

Under the new regulations Nevada hunters will have fifteen days out of the close of the duck shooting season, the season under the federal law ending on December 31, while the state law closes it on January 15.

The new regulations also make it lawful to shoot a half hour before sunrise and a half hour after sunset, providing it will not interfere with state regulations.

The department announces that the regulations do not permit hunting of migratory birds when it is unlawful under state laws.

POLICE SEARCH FOR OFFICER.

(By Associated Press.) SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Oct. 16.—Lieut. M. H. English, who has been missing since October 5 from Camp Fremont, became the subject of a police search when army officers reported the man's absence to the police today.

OVERSUBSCRIBED.

(By Associated Press.) WASHINGTON, Oct. 16.—The government's latest offering of \$300,000,000 4 per cent certificates of indebtedness has been heavily oversubscribed.

GOVT. REQUISITIONS COPPER PRODUCTION

The country's copper production for the balance of the year 1917 has been requisitioned by the government.

Outstanding contracts between producers and consumers will be suspended until such time as copper comes forward in sufficient quantities to enable their fulfillment.

The shortage in production, as evidenced in refinery yield during September, estimated at 135,000,000 pounds, against 150,000,000 pounds in August and 200,000,000 pounds in June, will now make itself felt far more seriously than was anticipated when the miners' strikes were at their height.

A committee of producers meets frequently in New York for the purpose of assisting the government in shipping the copper industry into shape under the new order of things.

The Engineering and Mining Journal, upon the basis of which quotations a number of mining companies sell their product to refiners, has adopted 23 1/2 cents a pound as its daily average.

MASONS COINCIDE SEC. BAKER'S ORDER

(By Associated Press.) WASHINGTON, Oct. 16.—George F. Moore, sovereign grand commander, in his address at the opening of the biennial session of the supreme council of the Scottish Rite Masons for the Southern Jurisdiction of the United States here, discussed Secretary Baker's order interpreted as excluding all organizations from camps and cantonments except two which are now active.

"The result of that interview was to convince me that the secretary of war had and has no intention to damage or to treat with disrespect any of the fraternities existing in the United States."

"The real service which can be rendered to the soldiers of our armies may be far more effective, far more useful, far more productive of good results on the outside than on the inside of their camps."

MEXICO SHIPS BULLION TO THE UNITED STATES

(By Associated Press.) MEXICO CITY, Oct. 16.—A large smelting company has shipped to the United States 5,730 bars of bullion. This shipment, it is said, is the first of any size sent out by the company from its Mexican smelters in several years.

BEQUESTS LARGE SUM TO BRITISH WAR FUND

(By Associated Press.) LONDON, Oct. 16.—Alexander Ashby, a planter who owned large estates in Barbados, bequeathed his two largest sugar plantations to the British secretary of war. The bequest, which has now been accepted by the British government, is valued at about \$250,000.
