STATE CONGRESS WILL BE CALLED

SACRAMENTO, Cal., Oct. 17.—President Wilson has approved California's proposal that a congress of states be called to work out plans for comity between the federal government and the states with regard to tax matters.

A telegram in which the president approved of the congress was made public here today. It was in answer to an inquiry from Governor William D. Stephens as to whether a conference at this time, dealing with the subject of taxation, would in any fashion embarrass the war tax plan of the federal government.

"Your telegram of the 7th received. I am very much interested in what you tell me of the proposed conference and of the favor with which the proposal has been received and I can see no objection which could rightly be urged against it or against its being held this year.

The congress was proposed by the California tax commission and upon its recommendation the state legislature at its last biennial session ratified a proposal for a meeting of all states to discuss the overlapping in tax jurisdiction of the federal and state governments, and by terms of the Benson-Argabrite resolution called upon the other commonwealths to indorse the movement and to arrange for the naming of delegates.

Already forty states are on record, either through action of the legislature or indorsements by governors, as approving the proposed congress. Several governors, while approving the conference, expressed the view that, owing to the war, it should not be held until it had received the approval of President Wilson.

Arrangements for the congress have been in charge of Alfred E. Holcomb of New York, treasurer of the National Tax association; Prof. Frederick R. Fairchild of Yale, editor of the National Tax Bulletin, and Edward A. Dickson, a member of the California state board of control.

"The purpose of the congress of states will be to evolve some plan clearly defining tax jurisdiction that will be mutually beneficial and mutually satisfactory to the federal government and the states," Mr. Dickson said.
