RUSSIA'S CONDITION SERIOUS

KERENSKY APPEALS FOR FAITH IN RUSSIA IN HER HOUR OF TROUBLE

But Says That Allies Will Have to Bear Burden

(By Associated Press.) PETROGRAD, Nov. 2.—Answering reports of the impression that is spreading that Russia is out of the war, Kerensky told the Associated Press that, although Russia is worn out with the long strain, it is ridiculous to say that the country is out of the war.

(By Associated Press.) WASHINGTON, Nov. 2.—In extenuating diplomatic circles in Washington Kerensky's statement could be regarded as discouraging. It was stated the allies have fully realized that Russia's condition is as he pictured and have made plans to meet the situation.

SAN ANTONIO, Tex., Nov. 2.—Sixty-three negro soldiers of the Twenty-fourth Infantry on guard duty at Camp Logan, Houston, Tex., were placed on court-martial trial here yesterday on charges of mutiny, murder and rioting in Houston on the night of August 22, last, during which twenty-two lives were lost.

ITALY WILL TAKE STAND ON NEW LINE

DIVISIONS DIE TO THE LAST MAN TO PROTECT REAR OF THE RETREATING FORCE.

(By Associated Press.) ITALIAN HEADQUARTERS IN NORTHERN ITALY, Nov. 2.—The Italian allied troops are preparing a counter offensive. A great battle is expected on the Tagliamento.

(By Associated Press.) AMSTERDAM, Nov. 2.—Emperor William telegraphed General Von Bellow congratulations on the successes in Italy. "Our faithless former ally has experienced what German strength and wrath can do," the emperor wired.

(By Associated Press.) ROME, Nov. 2.—The Italians are making a stand along the Tagliamento river and have repulsed the advancing Teuton patrols, says the official announcement.

WAR SUMMARY.

(By Associated Press.) The greater portion of General Cadorna's Italian army apparently has crossed the Tagliamento river and probably now stands on the western bank in a new line of defense waiting to give battle there to the Teutonic allies.

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GOVERNOR IS FLOATED.

(By Associated Press.) SAN PEDRO, Nov. 2.—The steamer Governor, which drove onto the breakwater last night, was floated at high tide today. It returned to the harbor under its own power.

ALLIES' PLANES SCORE HITS.

(By Associated Press.) AMSTERDAM, Nov. 2.—Dispatches received from Pirmasens, Bavaria, report an entente air raid and say bombs were dropped on the town and its environs. One person was killed and four were wounded, and some material damage was done.

TEUTONS STILL STRONG.

(By Associated Press.) WASHINGTON, Nov. 2.—There are still 147 Teuton, Turkish and Bulgarian army divisions facing the Russians, notwithstanding withdrawals of Germans for the Italian campaign, the Russian embassy announced today.

JAIL FOR DRAFT PLOTTERS.

(By Associated Press.) SIOUX FALLS, Nov. 2.—Prison sentences of one year to two years were imposed on the twenty-six Germans who were convicted of conspiring to obstruct the draft. Fines were assessed from \$300 to \$1,000. The alleged leader was sentenced to five years.

WILL STAY IN PETROGRAD.

(By Associated Press.) WASHINGTON, Nov. 2.—Information has been received here that the provisional Russian government will defend Petrograd to the last extremity. It has abandoned plans to change to Moscow.

Yankees Account For More Than One Sniper

(By Associated Press.) WITH THE AMERICAN ARMY IN FRANCE, Nov. 2.—German snipers are especially active on the clear days, according to Americans who have just been relieved of service in the trenches.

(By Associated Press.) INCREASED ARTILLERY on both sides featured the last days of the first Americans in the trenches. The Germans sent shrapnel in the direction of the trenches, but aside from enlivening things, accomplished nothing.

EXPORTING OF CORN PROHIBITED BY U.S.

State Solicitor Hayden Clement is seeking to have the trial held in some place other than Concord, which is Means' home town.

In presenting his motion, the solicitor said that the defendant had employed practically all the lawyers in this city to defend him; that when he sought a warrant for Means' arrest officials were reluctant to issue it, and that the prominence of the Means family in its 100 years of residence in this vicinity made it difficult to have a proper trial in Concord.
