WAR SAVINGS CAMPAIGN.

(By Associated Press.) WASHINGTON, Nov. 17.—A series of state conventions to get the war savings campaign under way was decided upon here last night at the final meeting of the federal and state directors, who will have charge of the campaign.

The first conventions will be held in New York, New England and New Jersey November 28 and others in different states will follow between that time and the opening of the campaign December 2. State publicity men and other officials will be named at the conventions to help carry on the work.

8,000 PLEDGE LOYALTY.

(By Associated Press.) ST. PAUL, Minn., Nov. 17.—As a demonstration of the loyalty of Minnesotans and the whole Northwest, 8,000 persons, representing every county of this state and the other commonwealths of the territory, gathered in the auditorium here and affirmed their purpose to stand back of the government in its prosecution of the war against Germany.

The audience, through the passage of a resolution, affirmed its determination to see the war through to a successful conclusion and pledged its support in "deeds, sacrifices and service."

ALASKA CHAMPS.

Victories were scored over Skagway, Seward, Cordova, White Horse, Juneau, Douglas and Thane.

STANDARD SHOE.

It was said the employers could not keep American harvesters at work on cotton, corn and other agricultural land in Lower California unless the food shipments are permitted and passport regulations modified.

BRITISH ROYALTY GREET AMERICANS

KING DISPLAYS DEEP INTEREST IN AFFAIRS OF THE UNITED STATES.

(By Associated Press.) LONDON, Nov. 17.—The king and queen yesterday entertained the members of the American mission to the inter-allied conference at luncheon in Buckingham palace. The king chatted with each of the members concerning the United States and displayed deep interest in their work in England.

On returning to Chesterfield House, the residence of the Duke and Duchess of Roxbury, where Colonel House and Mrs. House are guests during their visit in London, Colonel House had a two hours' conference with Lord Northcliffe, who yesterday declined an appointment as chairman of the British air board. Other members of the American mission continued their conference with British officials on phases of the war situation.
