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"IF THE CROWN PRINCE WERE TO COME"

There can be no lasting peace throughout the world until German militarism is forever crushed. There can be no peace so long as the Kaiser, or the members of the German royal family rule over any country, principality or power.

The empire of Germany has possibly scored the greatest achievements in a number of the arts and sciences of any people on earth, but all her research and accomplishments have been with one object in view, and that purpose was, and is, that some day she might dominate the civilized globe, even though to rule, she would destroy all other nations.

It is stated that a French scientist spent years in devising a scientific method by which the dead might be brought to life. He perfected his invention and was ready to try it out when an opportunity presented itself. He had a friend who had taken great interest in the invention. This friend was a highly educated man, a man who had done a great deal for humanity and the world.

Should the German crown prince come to America, thousands of our fairest daughters will be forced from their homes and sent to Germany to a fate worse than death. Should the crown prince come to America, the constitution of the United States, as well as that of our own state, will amount to nothing more than a mere "scrap of paper," to be destroyed at will; and in place of what we now have, as a guarantee of our God given rights, we will be forced to accept the edict of the oldest son of the Imperial, cruel and despotic Kaiser, and which could only be changed by him, and from which edict no appeal will lie, and no court dare construe.

The German motto from the beginning has been, and will continue unless their barbaric militaristic system is forever crushed, that "Might is Right," and in upholding and maintaining their slogan and watchword of frightfulness, they have committed atrocities, which would in all reality put the Yaqui Indians of Mexico to shame.

Can we prevent the crown prince from coming to America? We can if each of us will do all within our power. By saving every dollar and every cent and lending it to the government, this can be accomplished.

By saving all food possible, we can thus aid most materially in feeding our gallant soldiers and those of our brave allies across the distant seas.

By helping the Red Cross; the Y. M. C. A. and the Knights of Columbus to the fullest extent of our ability, and siding by all means within our power the meritorious efforts of the Elks Cross, the champion of the dumb animals that have done and are accomplishing so much for the maintenance of liberty.

Every one who fails to observe the regulations provided for the conservation of food, is assisting the Kaiser, and extending an invitation to the crown prince to come to America.

Every one who says: "This is nothing but a war of the money power," places himself or herself on record as a friend of Wilhelm of Germany and his monstrous government, and also as inviting the crown prince to come to America.

"RUSSIA MUST BE HELPED BY ALLIES"

(By Associated Press.) LONDON, Thursday, March 14.—Debate on the question of Japanese intervention in Siberia in the house of commons elicited the declaration by Foreign Secretary Halifax that the German penetration of Russia must be combated. The allied point of view was that they should help Russia in protecting herself against Germany. Although he did not think that Germany would send an army to Vladivostok, he said he had absolute faith in Japan's loyalty in carrying out any decision that the allies reached.
