INCOME TAX MAN MEETS WITH MANY PECULIAR PEOPLE

ODD METHODS EMPLOYED IN VAIN ATTEMPTS TO CLAIM EXEMPTION

Many interesting experiences are being met with by Victor S. Fehelmer, the United States income tax inspector who is at present in Tonopah...

"Well, it's hard to say. You see sometimes I lose and sometimes I win, but this thing is for a good cause and, well, anyway, I want to pay \$20."

After the usual questioning he was assessed that amount. In discussing the case the inspector said that such a spirit is not always found, however, and he went on to tell of two recent incidents in another mining camp of the state.

"He had evidently prepared for me and when we got through figuring out his income I collected the smallest amount that I have as yet turned in to the government. His tax amounted to exactly six mills and I charged him one cent, which he paid with a postage stamp. All during the interview he was in an excited condition. He finally went away only to return in a few minutes to tell me that he had forgotten to state that he was a married man and, of course, under those circumstances, exempt. I gave him his postage stamp.

"Another man, a foreigner, answered that he had been in this country continuously for nine years and when I asked him if he was married he answered that he had married just before he had left home but that his wife had never come over here and was still there. Later on I explained to him the clause relative to children and asked him if he had any. He almost knocked me over by answering that he had three, one seven years old, one five years old and one three years old. No, he didn't get away. I explained a few things to him briefly and he paid his tax. No, he spoke very good English and understood it."

NEW REGULATIONS MADE BY PARDONS BOARD

In a determination to better and make more regular the method of procedure of convicts for pardon or parole, the board of pardons and parole commissioners has adopted a uniform set of regulations and forms to be used by all such applicants.

Instead of advising the district attorney of the county from which they were sentenced of their intention to appear before the board, convicts in the future will fill out a prepared form and file it with the clerk of the board. The board will then convey the necessary information to the various district attorneys. Applications to be presented at the spring meeting must be filed by April 1 and for the fall meeting by October 1. The spring meeting of the board is scheduled for May 25.

DETRAIN GERMANS BEHIND FRONTIER

AMSTERDAM, March 27.—German troops going forward to the attack on the British front have detrained far behind the lines, even behind the Belgian frontier, according to the Rheinisch Westfaelische Zeitung correspondent. DEFENSE COUNCIL IS ORGANIZED TO AID GOVERNMENT

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE, COMPOSED OF PROMINENT CITIZENS

The organization of the Nye County Council of Defense, which held its first meeting on March 13th last, is now practically complete with a membership of about thirty of Tonopah's representative citizens. This body, being organized under the jurisdiction of the Nevada State Council of Defense at Reno, has an official status by virtue of federal authority. A suite of offices has been rented on the fifth floor of the State Bank building, a convenient location, and here the work of the council is proceeding energetically under the supervision of Judge Mark R. Averill, director; H. R. Cooke, president of the council, and Emil Elmer, secretary. The executive committee having control of affairs is composed of the following five members: H. R. Cooke, president; G. T. Lundie, Thomas Lindsay, Frank T. Miller and John H. Troy.

A third Liberty Loan Bond Committee, to have charge of the forthcoming campaign for the sale of Liberty bonds, has been appointed as follows: L. L. Mudgett, chairman; T. J. Lynch, Frederick Bradshaw, Pete Beko, and L. W. Horton. A transportation committee, to look after transportation needs in extending the work of the council to outside places, is composed of L. W. Harrington, chairman; Horace T. Campbell and William A. Marsh.

The full membership of the council at present is as follows: Mark R. Averill, H. R. Cooke, Herman W. Albert, Pete Beko, Jas. R. Blair, Frederick Bradshaw, Hugh H. Brown, Horace T. Campbell, R. B. Mudgett, Neils Nelson, George Rose, J. Wesley Stewart, Charles Toland and John H. Troy.

The activities of the council, in giving effective aid to the United States government in its war work, are at present classified under three chief heads. First, to take all necessary measures to bring about the apprehension and punishment of any individuals or organizations found guilty of disloyalty, sedition or other pro-German activity; second, to act officially in conducting the campaign for the sale of Liberty loan bonds, to help in promoting the interests of the Red Cross, the Blue Cross, or other movements sanctioned by the federal government; and third, to institute a vigorous campaign of education, especially through co-operation with teachers and school children, for the purpose of disseminating information generally throughout the county, so that all the people may be awakened to a full realization of the actual situation which confronts us. It must be understood that the Nye County Council of Defense has not been organized with the purpose of conflicting in any way with the activities of other voluntary organizations of private citizens, either in Tonopah or its vicinity. Rather, the council, by information and facilities at its command, will seek to aid such organizations in their particular work in behalf of the common cause.

One of the first important undertakings of the council is the organizing of community councils of defense in every school district throughout the county. This work is now well under way. Its object is manifest, for it means that in the course of time the spirit of every man, woman and child will become indexed in the records of the council, and their services enlisted in a united effort to hasten the end of the war.

The advices stated that there were discussions in the Ukrainian cabinet which was divided for and against the German demands.

AUSTIN, Tex., March 27.—The court of criminal appeals has reversed and remanded for a new trial the case of Harry Spanell, the hotel proprietor, who was found guilty and sentenced to five years for the murder of Lieutenant-Colonel M.
