COUNTER ATTACKS COLLAPSE

BRAVERY OF U. S. TROOPS REPELS ASSAULT OF THE GERMANS

AMSTERDAM, May 29.—Emperor William, who is on the battlefield south of Laon, telegraphed the empress today: "William, (apparently the crown prince) attack the British and French on the Chemin des Dames, where he strongly consolidated a height after being subjected to a mighty artillery fire, which had been stormed by our glorious infantry.

ALLIES RETIRE BEFORE OVERWHELMING FORCE

PARIS, May 29.—General Foch has the situation in hand and French troops are beginning to gain on the German advanced forces in a contest of speed. No important line communication is threatened by the German advance.

FIRE DESTROYS INSANE ASYLUM

COLUMBIA (S. C.), May 29.—Fire destroyed a ward in the state hospital containing 45 mentally defective patients. One is dead, four were burned and eleven are missing.

BRITISH AIR RAID IN BELGIUM PRODUCES PANIC AMONG WORKERS
