

# CAMP LEWIS HAS ONLY THEATER SELF SUPPORTING AMONG CAMPS

(By Associated Press.)  
**CAMP LEWIS, July 2.**—Camp Lewis has the distinction of having the only cantonment theater in the United States which is self supporting. At other cantonments actors and actresses have been asked to donate their services for entertainment of the soldiers, but the Liberty theater here bears the expense of salaries and transportation of theatrical companies, presents attractions at modest cost and realizes enough from seat sales to pay the cost in spite of counter attractions of two theaters in Greene park, the camp amusement zone, across the way from the Liberty theater.

Everything else at Camp Lewis is the biggest in the United States, why not the theater? This from Colonel E. A. Braden, manager, gives briefly the policy maintained in planning entertainment here. Colonel Braden has spent a life time in the theatrical business, managing some of the biggest enterprises and has drawn all of his experience into the management of the Liberty.

The colonel brought to camp the Orpheum vaudeville circuit, playing a two nights a week. The Orpheum is well patronized and frequently more soldiers seek seats than can be accommodated.

All the big road shows which visit Tacoma and Seattle are on the Camp Lewis bookings and occasionally there is some company which gives a free performance, bearing all the expenses and charging no admission. This was the case with Maude Adams, who played at camp, bringing her entire company at her own expense.

And between bigger attractions

there are good motion picture plays. The soldier wants to be amused, the colonel reasons, and the tragic drama and depressing pictures do not produce the right mental attitude.

This summer a stock company is producing light drama for the men. There are constant changes of program and this will be continued until fall when the Orpheum theater season opens.

# OIL GOES TO ALLIES UNDER THE OCEAN

**SUMMERLAND, Cal., July 2.**—Petroleum pumped from beneath the ocean, and brought up through the surf of the Pacific, is being sent from here to the refineries and thence to the aid of the American forces in France.

This field, one of the older of the petroleum pools in California, has the unique characteristic of extending from the mountains to the sea, and within a morning's walk. Derivatives and pumps, placed far out over the ocean bed, with waves constantly driving against their supports, serve to bring the crude oil up through watertight casings to the surface pipes which convey it to tanks along the shore.

Other wells stand on promontories along the beach, and thence, as the eye travels inland to the coast range mountains, it passes to still other wells with their surface works, some of them placed many hundreds of feet above sea level, but still within view from the wharves lining the shore.

Originally, oil men say, about a fifth of the production for the field came from the wells driven beneath the water; with the passing of the years the wells on dry land have in some instances grown less productive, while those pumping from the ocean bed have nearly all maintained their flow, so that now, it has been estimated, one-fourth of the output is from the submerged strip.

# MANGANESE FROM WHITE PINE MINE

L. A. Snyder, an old time mining operator of the southwest, who is representing St. Louis people owning the Siegel mines near Scheelbourne, arrived in Ely during the week, and secured a crew of men with which to resume operations on the property, says the Ely Record. It is Mr. Snyder's intention at the present time to commence the shipping of manganese ore as soon as the problem of transporting the ore to the railroad has been settled.

The government recently sent a geologist to the Siegel property, who reported a considerable tonnage of manganese ore developed there which is of very good grade. The Siegel properties were originally opened many years ago for the silver values, but with the decline in value of the white metal, work was suspended, and the property has remained idle ever since. At that time the manganese associated with the silver was a detriment to the property, but now there is a strong demand for both these metals.
