CLOSING IN ON THE KAISER

BACK in the middle ages some ingenious tyrant with a love for the novel devised a circular cell for the incarceration of prisoners. This cell was arranged to close gradually by the walls shrinking with every hour until they came so close that the sides of the cylindrical contrivance which was studded with spikes would embrace the captive and tear him to pieces with the excruciating torment of a thousand crucifixions. That was the devilish ingenuity of an age when cruelty was the uppermost thought in the minds of all rulers. In a modified sense the same fate may be said to be forecast for the kaiser whose malice and villainy is at the bottom of the war. The only difference between the inventor of the closing cell and the kaiser is that in this case the punishment will be commensurate with the offence for the kaiser will be the captive and his life will be blotted out as certainly as the unfortunates who incurred the ill will of other sovereigns.

The cell is closing in. The doom of the kaiser is sealed. The hand writing is on the wall. The die is cast. There cannot be any doubt about the beginning of the end for the portents state that the United States is just starting to demonstrate its power and willingness to carry this war through to the bitter end. In yesterday's Associated Press report in the Bonanza the last paragraph received tells what is going to happen by declaring that within a few weeks at most this country will be sending men and machines to Europe in such quantities that there will not be any longer doubt of the conquest of the upper atmosphere. The statement is printed on the word of Captain Herteux, one of the most famous French aviators, who has just returned from a visit to the United States. He is authority for the assertion that American pilots and machines are going over in large numbers and he adds with the voice of an authority that the hopes of the allies in this respect will be fully realized.

If the reader is quick enough to get the significance of that statement he knows that the long deferred execution of optimistic plans has arrived and that this country will soon pour its thousands of men and machines out on the fighting front as it has done its human elements to aid la Belle France in adjusting its differences with the central powers. Already we are sending fully equipped divisions across the waters and mobilizing them in the trenches far faster than the greatest generals the world has ever known could agree to accept as one of the possibilities of war. The production of ships has been an eye opener to the industrial world but we got there just the same and are going ahead at a rate that has never been equalled by any other power. War ships, destroyers and submarine chasers are slipping from the ways as fast as the production of flivvers or canoes and the facilities for loading and unloading are keeping pace with the era of ship construction. The United States as the home of centralized efficiency has been vindicated and the tardy acknowledgement that we are going to make good with our airplane service means that we soon will have the enemy at our mercy. We have control of the seas, we are seizing the strongest salients on land and when we dominate the air the enemy will be surrounded and overpowered until the only remaining move will be to close in in the deadly embrace of a nation in complete mastery of land, air and water. This has been accomplished with the illimitable resources of Uncle Sam applied with the patriotism of his scores of dollar a year men who are giving the best of their lives to win the war.

CASE OF THE KILKENNY CATS

A man has to be pretty alert these days in trying to keep posted about the latest movements in Russia. Reading the telegrams from Moscow, Vladivostok, Vologda or Archangel gives the impression that the Museovite people are in the position of the Kilkenny cats which were thrown over the line with their tails tied together that they might fight it out. The voracious Milesian authority for the legend states that the cats fought and fought until both swallowed the other and there was nothing left but the tails. Russia is in an analogous position since we read that the Bolshevik army is engaged in the effort to arrest the revolutionary leaders while the revolutionary leaders are employing their best talent to arrest the Bolsheviks. Then there are the Reds who appear to have no other interest than to rob every one with whom they come in contact while looking out for the safety of their own hides. The Soviet is another branch that is struggling for recognition and fast losing the slightest ascendancy it once possessed. On top of all these mongrel parties appears the Czech-Slovak army down in Siberia which embodies some real old fashioned ideas of government and a consciousness that the military force is essential to good government without resorting to the alternative of taking a vote of the privates every time an order is conveyed from headquarters. The drift of events at Washington leads to the belief that this government is dealing with the latter element which is in control of the most vital part of Russia and the most important open port that may be used throughout the long winters when all other harbors in the former empire are locked in the white fetters of a Polar winter.

The world is playing for a big stake and the incentive to seize parts of the former Russia are almost irresistible to those who are inspired by nothing more lofty than insatiable cupidity. It may require a strong and firm hand to evolve order out of this chaos but the opportunity is one that cannot be lost for glorifying our principles in the endeavor to rescue these poor people from their situation for the gospel theory of self government which has resulted in such a complete assimilation of anarchy. Russia will be saved eventually but it will have to be saved by other nations co-ordinating their efforts toward emancipation under direction of the United States, the only country that can come into court with clean hands and the proud assertion that it never engaged in a war of conquest.

DOLLAR SILVER IS CAMP REJUVENATOR

MANY ABANDONED MINES OF EARLY DAYS AGAIN HEAVY PRODUCERS

With silver at an established and assured price of \$1 per ounce, there will come the revival of many of the old silver camps of the west which were compelled to shut down more than twenty years ago because of the slump in the price of the white metal. Through all of the mining sections of Utah, Idaho, Nevada, Colorado and Montana there are scattered mines which were heavy producers of silver and lead in their halcyon days and which contributed to the support of good sized towns, the streets of which today are deserted. The surface workings of many of these mines have fallen into decay and the underground workings have in many instances become caved in and filled with water.

Capital, however, will not be slow to realize the extent of the buried treasures and the old towns, where the roulette wheels spun in the early days and the dance hall was the center of excitement, will be revived, but the gambling table and the saloon will be unknown. The silver and lead, however, will come forth from the ground and add to the material wealth of the nation.

Idaho already is beginning to feel the pulse of new life, particularly the Wood River district, according to a prominent mining man of Salt Lake who has just returned from a visit to that section. The Federal Mining and Smelting company, operating mines about twelve miles from Halley, is remodeling its flotation mill and within a short time will be shipping lead and zinc concentrates. This company is also again operating the Independence mine, six miles from Ketchum, in which an enormous amount of silver-lead ore has been encountered, some of the assays running as high as 200 ounces of silver to the ton.

The Kusa Mining company, operating at Lake creek, is now a heavy shipper of lead concentrate and carbonate ore to the Kusa smelter at Oklahoma, while the Eureka Development company is also shipping silver-lead ores from the old camp of Bullion.

The Mascot Mining company has begun extensive operations and is now contracting for a tunnel 1500 feet in length to explore their vein many hundreds of feet beneath the old workings.

While the mines of the Wood River district were never producers of heavy tonnage, the ores generally were exceedingly rich. Old timers say that every foot of ore in the old properties was equal in value to ten feet of ore in the average mine of other districts. The old Bullionville mine, for instance, in the early days was a regular shipper of ore which assayed an average of about 250 ounces of silver to the ton. The May Flower is said to have been an equally rich producer.—Salt Lake Tribune.

NEVADA FOREST FIRES

Numerous small forest fires in hills west of Reno during the past two weeks have done considerable damage to the small timber but so far as known the fires have been confined to small areas.



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
