CHICAGO, July 24.—The largest single order for bacon and canned meats in the history of the world—99,500,000 pounds of bacon and 124,000,000 pounds of canned meat—has just been placed by the quartermaster's department, U. S. A., for the American army overseas.

AVERILL DENIES CHANGE OF VENUE

Judge Averill, in the district court this morning, overruled a motion for change of venue in the case of Pat Mooney vs. Desert Produce company, a corporation, et al.

"If Newton were the only defendant, there could be no question of his right to a change of venue, but he has no greater rights in this respect than any other defendant. He does not show that he is the only defendant in fact, though others are named, nor does he attempt to show that the other defendants are not residents of Nye county. There being four of them, it may safely be assumed while nothing to the contrary appears that one of them is a resident of Nye county. The Desert Produce company, being a corporation, may have its residence anywhere in the state, since the place of its office does not necessarily fix its residence; but nothing appears to show that either Craig or Martin are non-residents of Nye county; and the court has no judicial knowledge concerning Martin, whatever may be the case as to Craig. Under these circumstances the court must assume that Martin at least is a resident of Nye county. The law on the subject applicable to this case reads: '... the action shall be tried in the county in which the defendant, or any of them, may reside at the commencement of the action; ...' Apparently one of them, Martin, resides in Nye county, which thereby becomes the proper county, or a proper county.

"The motion for a change of venue is overruled, and the demand of the defendant Newton that the place of trial be changed to Washoe county is denied."

ENEMY ALIEN MAY BE INTERNED FOR WAR

Lowell Daniels, assistant district attorney, and Miss Margaret Shields, court stenographer, left this morning for Round Mountain to take depositions in the case of Steve Ugarkovich, an enemy alien, who is held for using a knife on Steve Ugar, an Austrian countryman. The prisoner has always been regarded as a menace to the community where he lived as he is of a quarrelsome disposition and it is probable that an application will be made to the United States district attorney to have him interned. Ugar, whose injuries were considered dangerous, is recovering.
