Geo. T. Lundee has received an interesting letter from his Iowa nephew in France, which will be read with interest here, as follows:

The other day a Y. M. C. A. man and woman came along through the front line trenches with chocolate, tobacco, writing paper, etc., and believe me it sure seemed good to see and talk to a "Real American Woman."

Well, I have been in the front line trenches now for two weeks, going on the third and don't know when we will get relieved. Don't care much because I like it better here than back of the lines where we have to drill hard every day.

Saw a French and a German airplane do battle with machine guns for about ten minutes the other day, but no damage done on either side.

The Frenchmen hardly ever kill a rat and the Americans are learning not to because they are one of the best gas alarms we have besides they clean up all the food and filth that is spilt around in the trenches.
