### IMPORTANT NOTICE

To Secretaries of Corporations Doing Business in Nevada But Incorporated in Other States  
NOT TOO LATE TO SAVE \$100 PER MONTH

SECTION 1—All foreign corporations doing business in the State of Nevada shall, not later than the month of March in each year, beginning in the year 1914, publish a statement of their last year's business in some newspaper published in the State of Nevada. If published in a daily newspaper, such statement shall be published for a period of one week, or if published in a semi-weekly or tri-weekly newspaper, for a period of two weeks; or if published in a weekly newspaper for a period of four weeks.

SECTION 2—The secretary of the company publishing the statement shall file a copy with the assessor of each county of the State of Nevada, in which said company is doing business.

SECTION 4—Any district attorney in the state is competent to sue to recover the penalty, or the attorney general. The first county suing through its district attorney shall secure the penalty, and if no suit is brought for the penalty by any district attorney the State shall have the right to recover through its attorney general.

### BELGIUM FACES ACUTE CRISIS IN ORGANIZING POLITICAL LINES

(Correspondence Associated Press) BRUSSELS, Dec. 21.—Belgium is facing a crisis in its political history. The present government comprising six Catholics, three Liberals and three Socialists is acknowledged everywhere to be only a provisional one, a government of transition. A real government which will direct the reconstruction of Belgium is in the making.

It is not expected that elections can be held in less than six months. Meanwhile the political fight will be waged upon a basis of universal suffrage—this man, one vote. Before the war the priests had four votes, land owners and nobles as many votes as they had estates in different provinces and Socialists and Liberals only one vote each. The Socialists were mostly working men and the Liberals professional men. This enabled the Catholic party to be in power for more than forty years. Under the universal suffrage system which would relegate priests and landowners to the same category as working men, doctors and lawyers, it is asserted the Catholic party may be placed in the minority. Nevertheless, Cardinal Mercier's great personality and the energy he displayed in behalf of Belgians during the war

is said to have greatly helped the cause of the Catholic party.

One cause of bitterness and animosity in Belgium is the Flemish movement which now is practically dead owing to the efforts of the late German Von Bissing to make use of it to divide Belgium into two parts. It is expected that the Flemish movement will revive when life resumes normal conditions but it is held in abeyance now through fear that it might be construed as German propaganda. King Albert in his speech to the parliament after returning to Brussels announced that the government will propose a bill to create the bases of a Flemish university at Ghent reserving the details to the new parliament to be elected later.

Pro-German "activists" who supported the German scheme to drive a wedge between the Flemish and the Walloons in Belgium are now ostracized socially. Many arrests have been made in Brussels, Ghent and Bruges. The people of Ghent divide their hatred and bitterness evenly between the Germans and the "activists." Bruges is filled with a deep-seated hatred of everything German while Brussels ridicules both pro-Germans and "activists."

In Bruges 152 women who dealt with Germans were beaten and their hair was shorn. In Ghent pro-Germans and "activists," both men and women were physically punished.

### ALASKA TRAVEL PROVES SURPRISE

(By Associated Press) ANCHORAGE, Alaska, Dec. 20.—(By Mail)—Passenger traffic over the completed sections of the government's railroad has proved much heavier than officials of the Alaska engineering commission anticipated. Travel from the interior especially a greater than in former years, most of it being persons destined for the cities. ### HAWAII CANNOT VOTE ON HUMIDITY

(By Associated Press) HONOLULU, H. T., Dec. 20.—(By Mail)—The territory of Hawaii, made bone dry by action of congress last summer, cannot vote to reacquire ratification until the general territorial election in November, 1920, according to a recent opinion by the attorney general's office.

The act of congress making Hawaii dry provided for a plebiscite at any general election within two years after the formal declaration of peace.

### RADICALS THROWN OUT BY MOONEY MEN

(By Associated Press) CHICAGO, Jan. 15.—Attempts of the radicals including Socialists and Industrial Workers to capture the labor congress held in behalf of Thomas Mooney resulted in much discord. Credentials finally were refused to those who came as Socialists and Industrial Workers.

### HERRING FISHERS DO WELL

Splendid Catches and High Prices Have Been the Rule Among Them for Many Years Now.

The herring fisher works always on the night shift, not because the fish feed at night—herring take no special bait—but because they can be sold at night.

Taking their cue from the shade of sunlight as to the location of the herring, the boats go off two by two; they work always in couples; they arrive there they stop their motors, and gliding silently over the dark waters they look for the fish.

One of the men bumps the anchor two or three times on the bow of the boat, and instantly a patch of water lights up with a bright phosphorescent gleam. It is the herring, and the ring net (now more generally used in the west of Scotland than the driftnet) is lowered. It is held up by corks and has a small light at one end. This the partner boat picks up; they circle around the herring until the two boats come together, when most of the men climb into one boat, where they draw the net, with the herring, on board.

In this little Highland village the men of the last two generations have done well with the fishing. Their boats, complete with nets and motor, cost between £300 and £400, but only the other night a couple of boats, owned by brothers, divided £750 between them for one night's catch.—London Mail.
