

MOVING PICTURES SOFTEN RIGORS OF WAR

(By Associated Press.)
 PARIS, Feb. 12.—A whole freight car of moving picture films has been taken into Bohemia by the Foyer du Soldat, that arm of the American Young Men's Christian Association which ministers to the French and some other foreign armies over here.

The Foyer took the rough edges off of trench life so well among the Czech-Slovak soldiers in France that when some of the Czech-Slovak soldiers were designated to go on into Bohemia to bring order out of chaos they appealed to the national war council to send representatives to accompany them.

The Foyer in Paris detailed the following men: Irving D. Kimball of Lowell, Mass.; Ernest J. Wright, of Tulsa, Okla.; J. B. McCreary of Pitts- burgh, Pa., and a Mr. Burian and a Mr. Finney were sent from Italy to join the party.

They took with them, in addition to the carload of film, projection machines and cinema supplies, one car of tobacco, and one car of soap, chocolates, matches, cotton cloth, phonographs and records, books, etc.

Under the working arrangement the Foyer will not have to erect any buildings in the field in Bohemia. Buildings and barracks will be provided by the Czech-Slovak government.

For the present a good program of motion pictures will be the principal entertainment for the soldiers. A carter will be operated.

A. W. Davis, chief secretary of the Foyer du Soldat, is awaiting word from his men as to the work in Bohemia, upon the receipt of which he expects to dispatch another group of men with a second Czech-Slovak army.

HORSE THIEF CAUGHT BY OFFICER AT ELKO

Last evening at 5 o'clock Constable St. Clair of Deeth, captured Fred Craig, and in a fusillade of rifle bullets, the other man mounted his horse and made his escape, riding south, and was seen in Ruby valley. The capture was made a short distance from Halleck, after the officers had tracked the men for a long distance over the hills from the north, according to the Elko Free Press.

Word came to Sheriff Harris from the north that two men were driving a band of horses south. It was reported that the man had passed the Devil's Gate ranch headed south. Here the officers took up the trail and followed them down to the railroad and across to the south side, where they found the horses, 16 of them in the McIntyre field. The two men were found some distance away. St. Clair called on them to throw up their hands, and Craig complied, while the other man made a run for his horse and dashed away. The officer fired six shots at him.

There were 16 horses captured, bearing the following brands: Four branded TV, connected; five branded B; one branded FBV, one branded O; one branded figure 2. Three were without brands or the brands were indistinct.

IMPORTANT NOTICE

To Secretaries of Corporations Doing Business in Nevada But Incorporated in Other States
NOT TOO LATE TO SAVE \$100 PER MONTH

SECTION 1—All foreign corporations doing business in the State of Nevada shall, not later than the month of March in each year, beginning in the year 1914, publish a statement of their last year's business in some newspaper published in the State of Nevada. If published in a daily newspaper, such statement shall be published for a period of one week, or if published in a semi-weekly or tri-weekly newspaper, for a period of two weeks; or if published in a weekly newspaper for a period of four weeks.

SECTION 2—The secretary of the company publishing the statement shall file a copy with the assessor of each county of the State of Nevada, in which said company is doing business.

SECTION 3—Any district attorney in the state is competent to sue to recover the penalty, or the attorney general. The first county suing through its district attorney shall secure the penalty, and if no suit is brought for the penalty by any district attorney the State shall have the right to recover through its attorney-general.
