FILMING SCENES FOR "NEVADA" PLAY

Clyde C. Weaver, former president of the San Francisco Press Club and now managing the William Ott's film production, is here accompanied by Lloyd B. BILLIARD EXPERT DEFENDS TITLE

CHICAGO, Feb. 17.—August Kieckhefer, Chicago, world's three cushion billiard champion, defended his title for the eighth time in twelve months when he met Alfredo De Oro, the Cuban veteran, in a 150-point match here February 13, 14 and 15.

Seven times since he won the title from De Oro a year ago, Kieckhefer has sent his opponent down to defeat. Twice he conquered Robert Cannefax and Pierre Maupome, and also added Charles Otis and Charles McCourt to his list of defeated opponents.

Gurney Gordon Found Gold Reef 15 Years Ago

Gurney Gordon, manager of the Como Consolidated mine at Dayton, Nev., was among the arrivals this morning and instantly found himself surrounded by an interested group of listeners who sought to hear from him the story of how he became interested in the Divide district fifteen years ago and then leave what is now the most promising district in the state. Mr. Gordon located in the Gold Reef section when Goldfield was beginning to make a noise and he could not find any one willing to take a chance in financing the Gold Reef property which carried phenomenally rich knife-blade seams with all kinds of values. Men who were asked to take an interest said they did not want to place their money on theories and there the matter had to drop.

Among those who had faith in the district were Jack Hennessey, Charles Kieckhefer and Captain James Mayne. "I like to come back to the camp of Tonopah," remarked Gurney this morning, "for it is one of the best and luckiest camps in the world. Just when everybody thinks it is down and out something happens somewhere in the vicinity where the miners and prospectors all rush. When this excitement dies down they all come back and find some new orebodies in Tonopah and take a fresh grip on the camp. When I came here from Montana, there was a lot of the boys up on the hill who took me to one side and told me that Tonopah had been a pretty good old camp but that it was all in and they advised me to go to Goldfield. Look at that Mizpah claim!"

FIVE BUNGALOWS SENT TO DIVIDE

The Tonopah Divide company has bought five bungalows until recently occupied by employees of the Western Ore Purchasing company, at Millers, and the work of removing is going on as fast as men and trucks can do the job. The first of these houses was erected yesterday on the Divide and the others will be hauled in during the week. Each house has four rooms and the construction is better than the average home on the desert. The houses are of the bungalow type and not of the knock-down or portable house pattern. When it was decided to remove them the roofs and sides were sawed into convenient sizes for handling. The addition of these homes to the Gold Mountain district gives the place the air of a real live camp.

OTTAWA, Ont., Feb. 17.—Sir Wilfrid Laurier, former Canadian premier, is unconscious and slowly sinking following a stroke of paralysis yesterday. Death occurred at 3 o'clock.


