demanding an explanation of his vote, the reply follows: "W. W. Booth, Editor Bonanza, Tonopah, Nev. "Your wire, with others representing large mining interests, received soliciting my vote against resolution No. 3. It passed the house yesterday and may be reconsidered today. I am thoroughly convinced the resolution is the proper legislation for the people as a whole whom I was elected to represent. I voted my convictions and will continue to do so because of the trust and confidence placed in me by the masses of Nye county. I am not here representing the special interests, already too much favored and feel they need have no fear of just treatment. They should pay a just part of the proceeds taken from the resources of the state towards governmental expenses. This is not true under the existing law. You have my consent to publish this wire showing my position on this resolution."

"W. A. MARSH" In return the editor of the Bonanza challenges Mr. Marsh to prove that he ever submitted to an assessment of his flocks on the strength of their full value or that he ever paid taxes based on the full value of his holdings. The rejoinder of Assemblyman Marsh was undoubtedly dictated after a conference with the governor whose mouthpiece the Nye county lawmaker desires to appear as the language is entirely foreign to the capacity of the man whose signature is attached to the telegram. The bill stipulates that all deposits in banks be taxed and the action would cause depositors to pay the tax. Passage of the bill would cause depositors to withdraw from Nevada banks and carry their deposits in the banks of California and Utah.

He was followed by thirteen other automobile drivers at 15 second intervals. F. M. Pentecost, E. Murray and Joseph Hayes withdrew their entries because of mechanical difficulties. Prior to the race, Ralph De Palma, who could not enter because his car could not carry a mechanic as required by the race rules, made an exhibition lap at a speed of 92.7 miles an hour. The sheriff of Los Angeles county declared he would arrest after the race all drivers for violating the speed ordinance.
