ITALY REMAINS IMPLACABLE

Premiers Busy Trying to Induce Delegates to Stay in Peace Conference

FLIGHT OVER SIERRAS COMPLETED TO CARSON

By Associated Press. RENO, March 22.—Four army air planes successfully overtopped the Sierras for the first time and arrived at Carson City, Governor Boyle is entertaining the aviators at the expense mansion. They will start for Reno not later than 4 o'clock. They made the trip from Mather Field to Carson in 36 minutes. The greatest altitude was 14,000 feet. Governor Boyle abandoned his intention of making the flight from Carson to Reno.

769,500 SHARES TRADED

PARIS, March 22.—While the supreme council was occupied with the consideration of the western Polish boundary, the press were engaged in trying to solve the problems presented by the Italian declaration not to approve any peace treaty not including a settlement of the controversy between Italy and the Jugoslavians over the title to Fiume and the Dalmatian coast islands. The Italian delegates expressed the fear immediately after the conclusion of the German treaty that Lloyd George, President Wilson and perhaps other leading figures of the council would leave Paris and the remaining mem-

LOS ANGELES MAYOR CHARGED WITH GRAFT

LOS ANGELES, March 22.—Mayor Fredrick Woodman furnished \$19,000 last following the service of a warrant based on an indictment charging him with asking, receiving and agreeing to receive a bribe to permit certain negroes to operate gambling houses, "blind pigs" and immoral resorts. It is alleged that he accepted \$2000 as first payment of a sum of \$25,000. The mayor said: "The accusations are unqualifiedly false. Such a thing is to be expected at the beginning of the campaign. TRANSPORT LINES TIED BY STRIKE
