No one in authority would attempt to forecast the result of Hungary's declaration of a state of war, chiefly because of lack of official advisers. Any measure proposed or determined will be announced in Paris because of the president's presence there.

OPEN SHOP FOR YARDS OF FRISCO

IT BEATS NAPOLEON'S RETURN FROM ELBA

The problem before the supreme council, the Journal says, is the rebuilding of the collapsed bulwark against Bolshevism; otherwise Germany can lay down her own peace terms instead of those the allies propose to dictate to her and will take a lead in the Bolshevist movement.
