MUST MAKE HASTE IN WINDING UP

(By Associated Press) PARIS, April 1.—What is construed as a warning that the world could not long countenance further delay in adjustment of peace was delivered to allied premiers and military representatives of the associated powers by President Wilson yesterday.

AMERICAN SPY IN PALESTINE IS UNDER ARREST

(By Associated Press) WASHINGTON, April 1.—Secretary of War Baker has approved the request by British military authorities in Turkey that they be permitted to arrest on charges of treason James Spohr, a naturalized American, and wife who are declared officially to have been closely associated with the head of the German spy system in Palestine and among British Indian subjects.

The plan is to have the couple brought to the United States for trial. Spohr is said to be of German origin. He had been employed by Professor Saladin Ayoub, of the University of Jerusalem. His wife is of Scotch birth but, according to the charges, she is known to have lived at German headquarters. Both accused were engaged in a violent anti-British, anti-American propaganda principally through speech making and distributing inflammatory literature.

GROWING RESTIVE OVER SLOW GOING

(By Associated Press) PARIS, (Monday) March 31.—A feeling of apprehension over the lack of progress on the peace treaty persists in American circles here, although it is stated in authoritative quarters that differences which have arisen have not reached the status of a deadlock. The principal difficulty has been found in settling upon reparations according to the new method of payments suggested by the French delegations.

FRIENDLY RELATIONS AND LASTING HARMONY BETWEEN BIG INTERESTS

A deal pregnant with the most far-reaching influence was consummated last night after a protracted conference between the principals held in the Majah hotel. By this arrangement a large interest in the Divide Consolidated, which was promoted and controlled by the John H. Miller crowd, was absorbed by George Wingfield, H. C. Brougher, Clarence J. Berry and Herbert G. Humphrey.

This transaction brings the two most important interests of the camp into closer and more friendly relations and insures the best and quickest results in developing the Con. property. HUN REVOLUTION TEST OF ALLIES

(By Associated Press) PARIS, (Monday), March 31.—Reports to the French foreign office indicate that the Hungarian revolution was staged largely for the purpose of testing the strength of will of the entente powers and designed with the idea that Germany would fight as the allies would rapidly disintegrate.

BLOCKADE RAISED ON THE ADRIATIC

(By Associated Press) LONDON, April 1.—Regarding the published report that the blockade of the central powers had been raised, the general blockade department of the foreign office explains that the blockade has been lifted from German-Austria, but not Hungary. Along the Adriatic the allies raised the blockade some time ago but the Italian naval blockade remained effective until a few days ago. So far as Germany is concerned the blockade has been changed to the extent of sending food supplies there under allied control.

SERIOUS RIOTING (By Associated Press) LONDON, April 1.—Serious rioting occurred Monday at Frankfurt on Main, according to an Amsterdam dispatch. Crowds attacked the police stations and released the prisoners.

Tonopah has the money and the stocks; its people are eager to trade for they know the values and they are willing to set the pace by paying outright for what they order without asking for any concessions, courtesies or favors from the dormant bears on Bush street whom some people believe called a half day holiday for a week in order to protect themselves from bankruptcy through shorting this market. Two hours trading is not enough to satisfy the five wires of Tonopah and it is probable that the local exchange movement will be taken up seriously this evening by some of the leaders who have already secured an option on a central and spacious hall for holding sessions.

MORE OPERATORS KEEP WIRES HOT

Two more operators have been added to the force employed by the Western Union office in Tonopah to relieve the strain under which the former force worked. Manager Lag found it was impossible to make a clearance of business as fast as the demand required and took this step to improve the facilities of his office. The new men are William Wardenburg, of Vallejo, and William Quinlisk, of Sacramento, the fastest senders on the coast. The office now employs fifteen people. To keep up with the growing business in New York it has been found necessary to open at 6 a. m. and remain open until midnight. Sunday hours have been revised so there is an all day service instead of the former three hours in the afternoon.

TALK TIME VIRTUALLY AT AN END

(By Associated Press) PARIS, April 1.—President Wilson today explained that he is willing to accept his share of the responsibility for the peace conference delay. He was careful to point out that the slowness of negotiations was not due to any single country or its representatives and declared emphatically, however, that the time for talk was virtually finished and now was the time to show results.

EMPLOYERS START A COUNTER STRIKE

(By Associated Press) STUTTGART, April 1.—A bourgeoisie counter-strike has been started here as a reply to the general strike of workers. Most shops are closed and railroad postal services are suspended.

HUN TREACHERY OFFICIALLY SHOWN

(By Associated Press) PARIS, April 1.—Documents in possession of the French and Rumanian government, newspapers say, prove the advent of the communist regime of Hungary was due in a great part to a maneuver of Count Karolyi in union with the German government.
