(By Associated Press) PARIS, April 4.—The Italian transport Nubria, with 2000 officers and soldiers aboard bound from France to Tripoli, was struck by a mine and sunk according to advices from Bari. Several were killed and a hundred injured.

(By Associated Press) WASHINGTON, April 4.—Steel for the navy continues to be bought on competitive bids regardless of prices agreed upon by the industrial board with the industry and whatever may be the outcome of the conference now going on to determine the future policy of the board. Acting Secretary Roosevelt said this decision was reached after local officers of the department had ruled that the department was required by law to secure material in public advertisement of contracts.

They had it all their own way yesterday when the big leader dropped to \$8.50 bid, but the men at the mines were laughing at what would happen, for they were happy in the knowledge that the Tonopah Divide which was supposed to have reached the peak of possible values when a full face of \$496 was reported last week, had brought in another and even greater phenomenon with the authentic report that the south drift on the 480 level carried a full face of ore carrying 2650 ounces of silver with light values in gold or approximately \$2700 a ton. The story leaked out last night and New York began bidding furiously for the stock. The opening on the eastern curb was \$9.12 1/2 which soon gave way to \$9.50 with heavy trading. In San Francisco the market opened at \$9.50 and sold up to \$10 flat. Brought down at \$1.95, reached a high of \$2.82 1/2 and closed at \$1.97 1/2 on orders for 11,100 shares. In quantities Rosetta was the leader the sales aggregating 133,500 with prices holding steady throughout the greater part of the session. The opening was at 36 and under pressure of heavy buying orders the top was reached at 41 from which there was a slight reaction closing firm at 40. Divide EX was next big trader with sales of 103,500, opening at 80, reacting to 82 and closing at 80. Verdé Divide which was introduced on the New York curb at 2:30 yesterday afternoon by Charles E. Knox sold at 66. The gross sales were 74,200 shares with the following sales of the most active stocks: Hasbrouck 11,300; Divide Ex 107,500; Broughter 11,100; Gold Zone 74,700; Rosetta 133,500; Silver King 21,000; Divide, Jr. 40,000; Divide Annex 27,500; Verdé Div 17,500; Midway 39,500.

(By Associated Press) WASHINGTON, April 4.—Charges of gross carelessness and negligence in preventing and controlling the spread of typhoid fever in the army are made against many medical officers serving with the forces overseas in a circular published by the chief surgeon of the American expeditionary forces, made public today in connection with a warning that vaccination does not give complete immunity from typhoid, the chief surgeon warns his subordinates that now the excuse "there is war on" will no longer be tolerated and that they will be held responsible for proper supervision of the health of the troops.

(By Associated Press) ARCHANGEL, April 4.—The American casualties during the last two weeks of fighting about Bolshevik Ozera include one officer and five men killed and seven wounded. Nine others are unofficially reported missing.

The Silver Divide and Grimes Divide will be developed under the management of Charles Mayotte, according to President J. I.
