Clark Divide Company Will Adopt Leasing

The Clark Divide company was organized last evening at the office of Harry Stimler in the Mizpah hotel when the group of six claims recently located two miles south of Klondike was turned over to Roy W. Martin and associates of Las Vegas, Nev. This is the group that caused such a sensation last week through discovering high values right at grass roots and which caused a stampede in the new section shows no abatement as over 15 machines were counted there last Monday. The men who have taken over the Clark Divide group are satisfied they will make a mine, as the ledge is carried in an andesite hanging wall with porphyry on the foot. At first it was proposed to call the new district the New Goldfield Divide. But on second thought it was deemed best to adhere to the name of the location.

Roy W. Martin is one of the leading business men of Las Vegas who has been largely interested in mining at Eldorado Canyon and other districts of the southeastern end of the state. Associated with him are Howard Conklin and George A. Duncan, a mining engineer who for years was identified with the Guggenheim interests and has lately been operating on his own account. Charles R. Topping, of Hannapah and Thomas Clark, father of the location. The company has decided to adopt the leasing system in order to satisfy the numerous applicants. The first lease granted was to James Shea, the Manhattan operator, and W. J. Douglas, manager of the Tonopah Midway mine who will proceed to sink the shaft where the big assays were taken last Saturday.

O. on his opponent but could not deliver the goods.

At the finish, when the bell told of the twenty-five rounds having been fought, Referee Emory Arnold raised the arm of McCarthy, declaring him the winner of one of the hardest fought fights ever witnessed in this city. The contest last night was declared to be the best pulled off since the Gans-Nelson fight was staged in Goldfield. A crowd of house of fight fans was on hand and cheered their man as the moment would permit.

"Salinas" Jack Robinson, who needs no introduction to the boxing fraternity, put up a good scrap and showed that he was game to the core. Several times he went to his corner in a dazed manner, only to come up in the next round fresh and always willing to mix matters with the favorite of Tonopah, Johnny McCarthy.

Both boys fought a clean fight and those who were fortunate enough

to witness the affair were more than pleased.
 The preliminary between Al Guinan and Roy Brennan, of San Francisco, was a one sided affair. Guinan was several pounds heavier than his opponent and with his knowledge of roped arena affairs led all six rounds. Referee Quigley gave the fight to Guinan.
 Promoters Rainier and Quigley are to be complimented on bringing such men as McCarthy and Robinson to this city, thus affording the fight fans an opportunity to witness some of the Class A scrappers.




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
