

Rugby Players Hampered By Knowledge of Game

(Correspondence Associated Press)
 PALO ALTO, Calif., May 8.—Coach Bob Evans of the Stanford football team is among those who hold the opinion that Rugby players are handicapped rather than helped by their knowledge of the English game when they come to take up the American inter-collegiate sport.

"Stanford's team next year," said Evans, "will depend upon the way the men in school who have had actual experience in playing the game come out for the team. Although there have been instances where former Rugby players have helped into good American football (and no doubt some former American men will be stars on Stanford American teams) the odds are in favor of the boys who have played the American game in high school."

The reason for this, as pointed out by football men, is because the two games differ in fundamental principles. In the American game possession of the ball is a big advantage; this permits of the offensive while the opposing team is pinned in its defensive. In rugby possession counts for little; the ball becomes the most important in the open.

The American game gives the man-hand and leg a better technique than the English game. In Rugby the tackling is such for the reason that a secondary purpose of the tackler is to frustrate the passing of the ball if possible.

Interference under certain prescribed rules is a feature of the American game, while in rugby it is taboo at all times.

According to Evans, Stanford's star right in this spring is to try to pick up again of the American game which was taken up last year after a decade at Rugby.
