DREAMS USED TO CURE NERVES

LONDON, April 22.—Curing nerve shattered soldiers through their dreams is the latest experiment of the British army medical corps, and according to Captain M. Culpin, it is succeeding beyond all expectations.

"In the method I adopt," Dr. Culpin says, "the patient relates the dream to me. I question him about it and if the underlying memory is not deeply blurred this questioning may recall it, and it is only necessary to insist upon the man talking about the incident."

"Next I make the patient close his eyes and visualize the dream, and I try to ascertain what particular feature causes emotion. By dwelling on this feature I induce an emotional state and assure him that he felt like that before and that memory is coming up."

"When success is attained there is a sudden change of facial expression or even an access of terror. By this I know I have reached the true cause of the dream. The merest scrap of a dream suffices."

CANNOT REDEEM FRENCH TOWNS

PARIS, April 21.—Investigations by the commission which is examining the devastated regions of France are confirming the previous evidence that many of the beautiful towns and hamlets of the battle area are so totally ruined that they never can be rebuilt.

Vaux, of immortal fame, has taken its place in the long list, and the mayors of two other historic villages, Douaumont and Fleury, have recently notified their people, who are refugees in various parts of France, that these places cannot be reclaimed.

INCREDIBLE SUFFERINGS OF ARMENIAN PEOPLE

LONDON, April 16.—The sights one sees in Armenia are almost beyond belief, and the tales one hears are too ghastly to be inventions.

This is an extract from a letter an Armenian medical officer, writing from the base of Mount Ararat, to a fellow countryman in London. The letter says:

"It may interest you to know the awful state of distress existing in the country here. Thousands of people are homeless and absolutely destitute. In the town of Erivan alone there are 35,000 refugees. Their country has been ravaged, the houses burned, and the survivors who escaped with their lives have nothing but the rags they are wearing."

WINNIPEG STRIKE NEARING AN END

WINNIPEG, May 22.—Aggressive resumption of commercial enterprises paralyzed by a week's general strike began today while government officials conferred with union leaders in an effort to settle the industrial disagreement.

SUIT OVER THE BALDWIN ESTATE OF TEN MILLIONS

LOS ANGELES, May 22.—Trial of the suit to have Mrs. Clara Baldwin Stocker, daughter of the late E. J. "Lucky" Baldwin, the noted turfman, declared incompetent to handle her \$10,000,000 estate was begun today in the Superior court.

ARMENIANS EAT HUMAN FLESH

CONSTANTINOPLE, May 22.—Starvation and misery prevail among the Armenian refugees in the Caucasian region, said a telegram sent to Hoover by Howard Hoitz, American food commissioner for the near east. He said food for half a million in that territory will have to be provided by outside sources for another year.

PITTMAN PLEADS FOR THE LEAGUE

WASHINGTON, May 22.—Senator Key Pittman urged ratification of the new treaty without delay when he presented it in the senate. He said amendment of the league of nations covenant would mean rejection of the whole treaty, and the proposing of a new one.

OCTOBER 25 IS RED NEW YEAR

HELSINGFORS, May 1.—The Soviet government has introduced a new chronology whereby the year begins October 25. The date of the establishment of the Bolshevik regime. The year will contain 280 working days.

CITY CRIPPLED BY THE STORM
